### ILLINOIS PARAGRAPHS

**KANKAKEE**—Shortly following a savage attack by a fellow patient, James Frankie of Streator, died at the Eastern Illinois Hospital for the Insane at Kankakee, Ill. His assailant was John Applequist. It was bath day. While the baths were in progress Applequist became involved in a melee with Frankie and knocked him down and kicked him in the abdomen. Attendants who had charge of the baths were unable to reach the two men in time to prevent the assault. Frankie was twenty-one years of age and was committed to the hospital from Streator. Both he and Applequist were inmates of the relief ward, the most violent ward in the hospital.

**STERLING**—As the direct result of the birth of a son to Miss Mary Isenhart, housekeeper for Rev. W. T. Abel, pastor of the Morrison Methodist Episcopal church, the minister has handed his resignation to District Superintendent Claude S. Hoore. The child was born one week ago, and since that time public feeling against the minister has been at a high pitch. Miss Isenhart is twenty-three years of age and has been a member of the minister's household for the last three years. Abel denies partenance of the child and declares that his resignation from the ministry is the result of his belief that he has not been treated with the Christian love due him.

**SPRINGFIELD**—Adjutant General Dickson of Illinois has had applications from 540 survivors of the battle of Gettysburg, who wish to avail themselves of the opportunity to attend the memorial celebration at Gettysburg, Pa., as guests of Illinois July 1, 2, 3 and 4. The forty-eighth general assembly appropriated \$20,000 to defray the expenses of such a delegation. The bill for the appropriation provides that each veteran shall be furnished with transportation to and from Gettysburg and, in addition, \$10 in cash for expenses, the \$10 to be paid to him through the county clerk in the county where he resides.

**SPRINGFIELD**—The "dry" gained a victory in part in the house by passing their residence district bill and the bill prohibiting saloons within four miles of the campus of the University of Illinois. They also prevented the passage of the bill which in effect would have repealed the present township option law and the "wet" bill permitting the sale of liquor on buffet and dining cars on railroad trains.

**SPRINGFIELD**—Dr. Isaac L. Fremmel, who was assistant superintendent of Dunning asylum, Chicago, has been appointed assistant superintendent of the State Hospital at Elgin to succeed Superintendent C. D. Dicks, who resigned last week. Dr. Filders, superintendent of the Kankakee State Hospital, has also presented his resignation to the state board of administration.

**SPRINGFIELD**—The civil service committee of the legislature voted favorably on a bill limiting the tenure of state employees under civil service to four years. The bill also provides that persons in the state service who came in under the "blanket" clause, should take examinations before they are secure in their position.

**BLOOMINGTON**—A rather unique series of revival meetings among the rural churches of central Illinois has been commenced by the Methodist church. Clergymen from the larger cities will conduct the services in the country churches. The pastors will be alternated in the various pulpits so that there will be a constant change of speakers.

**SPRINGFIELD**—Governor E. F. Dunne has signed a bill appropriating \$10,000 for an investigation of the \$1,000,000 Chicago voting machine contract. The investigating committee, which will be appointed within a few days and start work soon after the legislature adjourns, will report at the 1915 session of the legislature.

**PEORIA**—Seven of the Industrial Workers of the World, who went on a "hunger strike" in the city fall here and broke up the dishes which were given them, were fined \$200 and costs by a jury in the city police court and sent to the workhouse for six months each.

**ROCK ISLAND**—The last will of Mrs. Mary L. Deere, who died recently in Rock Island county, distributed a large estate, the bulk of which goes to the grandsons and daughter. Among the minor bequests is \$20,000 to Daisy Taylor of Evansston.

**MENDOTA**—An item appearing in this column a few days ago announced that the Illinois Valley Harness Racing association would hold races here July 4 to 6. This was an error. The races will be held here July 5 to 11, inclusive.

### An Ordinance for Licensing Vehicles

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Highland Park:

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to use or cause or permit any of his or its agents or employees to use any wagon or other vehicle in the transportation of persons or property upon the streets, avenues or alleys of the city unless such wagon or vehicle be licensed as hereinafter provided; provided, however, that this ordinance shall not be construed as applying to street cars running on metallic rails.

Section 2. That any person, firm or corporation desiring a license for any such wagon or vehicle shall file an application with the city clerk, upon form provided by him, setting forth the name and address of the applicant, description of the wagon or vehicle for which the license is desired and the place where such wagon or vehicle is to be kept when not in use; also the number and kind of other wagons or vehicles kept by said applicant at such place and such information as may be prescribed; such application shall be transmitted to the Mayor of the city and upon the payment by the applicant of the license fee hereinafter provided to the city collector, the Mayor of the city shall issue or cause to be issued a license, which shall be attested by the city clerk authorizing the use of such wagon or vehicle within the city until the expiration of such license.

Section 3. That the license fees to be paid annually to the city of Highland Park shall be as follows:

One horse wagon or vehicle.....	two dollars
Two horse wagon or vehicle.....	three dollars
Three horse wagon or vehicle.....	six dollars
Four horse wagon or vehicle.....	eight dollars
Six or more horse wagon or vehicle.....	twelve dollars
Motor bicycles or motor tricycles.....	five dollars
Automobiles and motor vehicles of 35 horse power or less used for the transportation of persons.....	ten dollars
Automobiles and motor vehicles of more than 35 horse power used for the transportation of persons, exclusive of trucks, coaches, omnibuses and motor vehicles used for commercial purposes.....	twenty dollars
Motor driven commercial vehicle used for light delivery purposes carrying one ton or less.....	ten dollars

Automobiles, trucks, coaches, omnibuses and other motor vehicles used for commercial purposes (except light motor driven commercial vehicles used for light delivery purposes carrying one ton or less)..... thirty dollars.

All such licenses shall expire on the 30th day of April following the date of issue and when issued for a period of less than one year the fee to be paid for the unexpired license period shall be the proportionate part of the annual rate fixed by the ordinance, but no fee shall be less than one-fourth of the annual rate.

All revenues derived from such license fee shall be kept as a separate fund and used for paying the cost and expenses of cleaning, repairing or in any way keeping in good and proper condition the streets or alleys of the city.

Section 4. That upon the issuance of said license, the city clerk shall deliver to the applicant a metal plate bearing a number and the name of the class to which such wagon or vehicle belongs and the year for which such license is issued, and it shall be the duty of the applicant to affix such plate in a conspicuous place upon the right side of such wagon or vehicle or upon the right side of the horse drawing such wagon or vehicle where it can readily be seen; and it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to use or cause or permit any agent or employee to use any such wagon or vehicle, although duly licensed, upon the streets, avenues or alleys of the city unless such plate is affixed as above provided; provided, however, that it shall not be necessary for owners of automobiles, or motor bicycles or motor tricycles to have the metal plate, bearing a number provided for in this section, attached to such vehicle, and, provided further, that it shall not be necessary for any wagon or vehicle to have the aforesaid metal plate attached to it except when actually in use upon the streets, avenues, or alleys of the city.

Section 5. That any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than five dollars (\$5.00) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for each and every offense, and each day any wagon or vehicle is used upon the streets, avenues or alleys of the city without having procured a license, and without having complied with the provisions of this ordinance, shall be considered a separate and distinct offense.

Section 6. That nothing contained in this ordinance shall be construed as in any manner repealing any ordinance or parts of ordinances as amended and as now in force in the City of Highland Park, relating to any particular business

now being licensed by the City of Highland Park, wherein wagons or other vehicles are being used upon the streets, avenues or alleys of the city.

Section 7. That this ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication.
