REPORT OF CITY COUNCIL MEETING

Aldermen Transact Much Business in Second Session held this Month. Pass Ordinance for Paving of Rice Street

APPROPRIATIONS ARE HELD UP

Members Repeal Ordinance Passed at First Session, Fail to pass new one in Appropriations for Corporate Purposes

We have received a letter from Alderman Fearing in explanation of the appropriations made by the council at the meeting of June 3, for additional clerks, a policeman and a fireman. As we have heard no criticism of these appropriations we do not believe that they need explanation so refrain from publishing the letter though it was interesting as are all of Mr. Fearing's letters on city affairs. The Press wishes that more of the aldermen would make use of its columns and thus keep the citizens of Highland Park better informed of what they are doing or trying to do.

However, even if the public has no criticism of these appropriations it is evident that some of the aldermen have, for in the meeting held Friday night, a motion to suspend the rules in order to adopt an ordinance authorizing the city clerk to employ an assistant at a salary of \$70 per month was lost. In consequence the ordinance was ordered engrossed, probably delaying important work in the clerk's office.

Paving Business Transacted

The Board of Local Improvements was instructed to employ an engineer to prepare an estimate of the cost of paving Central Ave. from Sheridan Road to the lake.

Adopted an ordinance for paving Rice St. from Roger Williams Ave. south 630 feet.

Appropriation Ordinances Engrossed

The aldermen failed to get together on the appropriation ordinances and in consequence the salary ordinance was ordered engrossed and, after repealing the one passed and at the previous meeting, they were forced to order engrossed the ordinance making appropriations for corporate purposes. Ald. Nichols cast the dissenting vote in each case.

Accept Bonds of Officials

The recommendation of the finance committee that the bonds submitted by city officials be accepted and that the bond of the fireman in charge of the station be raised to \$500 and that of the second fireman be placed at \$250 were accepted. The city attorney was requested to prepare an ordinance for same and the firemen ordered to furnish temporary bonds.

Order C. & M. E. to Repair Crossings

The street and alley committee was ordered to notify the Chicago and Milwaukee Electric to repair the crossings at all street intersections on its line in the city. In this respect the Northwest, which is considerably behind the Northwest, which is now making these repairs, and its crossings are in bad shape.

Other Business Transacted

Referred attention of street and alley committee to drain pipe in ravine at Sheridan north of Moraine Road.

Question of building foot bridge over ravine at Linden Ave. between Prospect and Hazel referred to street and alley committee with request that members confer with property owners interested regarding same. The old bridge was ordered removed and temporary sidewalks laid in parkway were ordered.

Ordered the purchase of 10 barrels of Tarvia for repairing improved roads.

Chief of police ordered to sell motorcycle and turn money over to collector to be applied on purchase of new one by the police committee.

City attorney requested to notify property owner to take care of open well in lot at south-west corner of Bloom and Clark Streets.

After the fire and water committee recommended the purchase of a horse, harness and wagon at a cost of \$175 to take the place of the outfit now hired at \$25 per month the mayor was ordered to appoint a committee to investigate and report.

In the matter of the removal of a building by I. Goldberg referred to in last report, the building and grounds committee reported that it had no authority in the matter. The committee, however, questioned the right to move the building.

LOCALS AGAIN WIN GAME BY ONE RUN

BEST CONTEST STAGED THIS SEASON

Greenslade Whiffs Ten and Crescents Trim Crescents 2 to 1 Sunday. Big Crowd Seen Great Game

The Crescents have staged a number of close and well played ball games at the Lincoln Ave. grounds this season, but their contest last Sunday with the Greenslade Whiffs put all the others in the shade. It was certainly a bully game, which the locals won by a 2 to 1 count. To the victors, because of their all round playing, belongs the greater share of praise, but the losers played a magnificent defensive game. They proved the toughest proposition the locals have been up against so far this season, not even excepting the Usonias, who, a few weeks ago, administered to the home team its only defeat.

The Highland Park boys played with speed and precision, especially the infielders and the battery. Three lightning fast double plays, engineered by Richards, Shields and Flinn at critical junctures, were not only remarkably fast fielding stunts, but helped to avert impending rallies or choked them to death after they had partly developed.

Greenslade's fine twirling, too, had an important bearing on the result of the game. Altogether he whiffed ten batsmen, seven of the strike-outs coming with runners on the paths and the visitors in position to drive them home. The seven hits he yielded were well scattered. The Concord's lone run was really a gift. The first batter to face Bob in the eighth secured a lucky hit on a high fly that dropped between F. Glader and Richards. The confusing shouts of their mates caused a mixup or Joe might have converted the rap into an out. A sacrifice hit advanced the runner to second and he scored on a safety to left.

The visitors' work in the field was well high perfect. Nothing escaped their offense that it was possible to field, twice their throws killed local runners at the plate.

Neither team was able to score until the sixth inning, when the locals peeled off three hits in a row, which produced their first tally. Again in the following period the Crescents' cut loose with a trio of safe swats from which sprung their second and final score. Only for the fact that the opposing twirler tightened in the pinches and his support was too rigid to budge, the locals might have made more of their half dozen openings to score. Score:

It appeared from the lively practice and the speed of the Chicago team in the earliest stage of the game that Deerfield had a hard fight on hand. Even Jake Mentzer expected defeat for the home team and Jake is a pretty good authority. In the second inning, after feeling out the strength of the opponents, Manager Hutchison planned and started the attack. Singles by Duffy and Bob Pettis, a base on balls and perfect bunt, by Mike Pettis and the manager himself, resulted in the complete breaking up of the visitors' infield. Victory easily followed; triples, bunts and line drives came in rapid succession, until by the eighth inning, seventeen tallies were credited to the home athletes. Special honor is due to Bob Pettis. He played his game at short in real Joe Tinker style, taking eight hard chances without a sign of error. Mike played an air tight game on the keystone and Duffy starred as usual on third. Kress pitched in big league style, allowing only two hits, both singles. His curves broke quick and he had perfect control at all times. STATE DAY AT NAVAL STATION

Many Distinguished Visitors Expected at Training School June 28

Members of the legislature, the United States senators and members of Congress from Illinois, several mayors of Illinois cities and presidents of many civic organizations have been invited to be present at the Illinois state officials' day observance at the Great Lakes Naval Training Station at Lake Bluff on Saturday, June 28.

The program of the day will begin with a lake trip to the naval training station, leaving the Chicago Yacht club at 9:30 o'clock in the morning. Luncheon will be served in the Seamen Apprentices' hall, following which there will be addresses by many of the visitors, and a drill by 500 young men who are being trained for the navy. The program will conclude with a general inspection of the station. Fifty-three recruits, the largest number ever received on any day, entered the station Friday. There are now seven companies of recruits in training.
