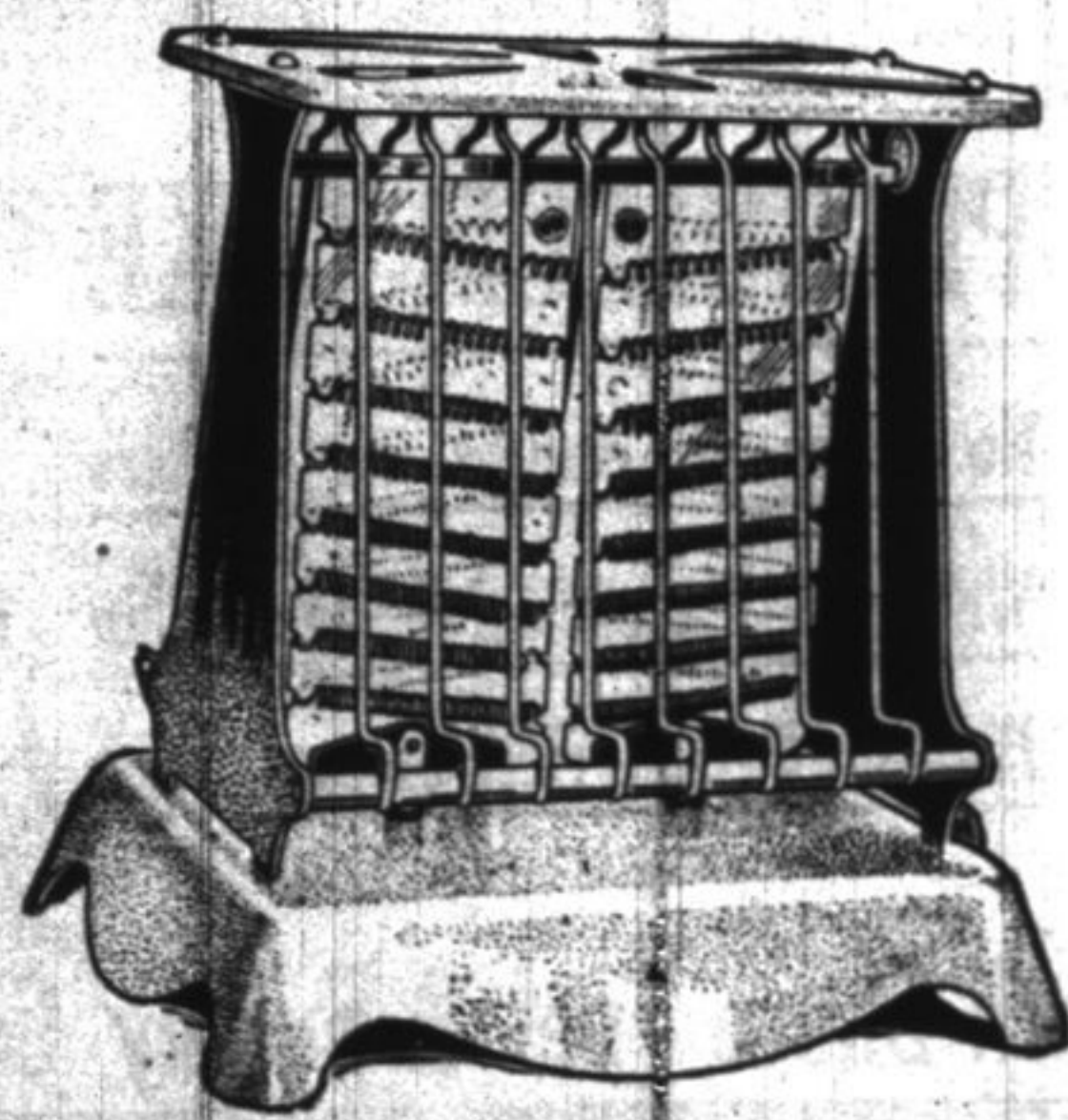

REPORT OF CITY COUNCIL MEETING

and moved that the question be referred to the city attorney. The building in question has already been moved and repaired by Mr. Goldberg.

In view of the number of chairmen he will have to consult it is doubtful if the city clerk can move very fast in the cases referred to but he was authorized to purchase supplies not to exceed \$50 in cases of emergency, after he gets the recommendation of the mayor and the chairmen of various committees.

Mr. Carl Hoermann believes the city should pay the cost of repairing damages to his auto, the result of trying to hurdle stumps which have been left in the street in front of his place. Mr. Hoermann is modest in his claims and asks only \$7.

An ordinance amending sections 30 and 31 of chapter 3, entitled "City Attorney" and defining the duties of that official, was referred to the judiciary committee.

In the matter of the sewer on Green Bay Road north of Vine Ave. and on Park and Linden the sewer committee recommended that manholes be built and overflow be carried in pipes to ravines in both cases. The recommendations were concurred in and the bid of E. E. Farmer of \$125, accepted.

The superintendent of water and sewer mains was instructed to make necessary repairs on South Highland sewers as soon as possible.

A petition signed by the North Shore Trust Co. and others requesting the council to condemn a building in the rear of the Ringdahl Livery was referred to the fire and water committee.

Petition from property owners relative to oiling Central Ave. from Green Bay Road to tracks was referred to the street and alley committee.

Letter from J. L. Udell relative to printing council proceedings referred to finance committee.
