Obituary
Alexander McDougall, born October 22, 1835 at Halifax, Nova Scotia. Died July 8, 1913 at Highland Park, Ill. Alexander McDougall came to Illinois in 1853 and engaged in farming in Lake County. Later he gained prominence during the Naval Rendezvous at Chicago throughout the years of the Civil War after which he was connected with a Chicago daily newspaper for several years. He then went to Minnesota in which state he engaged in agriculture. In 1882 he became identified with the grain trade and was active in the grain commission business on the Chicago Board of Trade up to the time of his death.
Mr. McDougall was a man who was greatly respected and his death is a decided loss to the community. His friends were many and it may be truly said "Where he met a stranger there he left a friend."
The funeral services are to be held today at 2:30 p. m. Burial private at Lake Forest.
