An Ordinance Fixing the Salaries of City Officers and certain Employees of the City of Highland Park

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Highland Park:
Section 1. That the salaries of the following city officers and employees, be fixed at such a sum as is provided for by this ordinance for each officer, or employee, for the discharge of the duties of such office as required under the laws of the State of Illinois, and the ordinances of the City of Highland Park, during the term of his office, or employment, commencing the first day of May A. D. 1913, and that such officer or employee shall receive no further compensation from the City of Highland Park, for the duties of such office during the term thereof.
That the salary of the Mayor, be and is hereby fixed at the sum of One Hundred and Fifty (\$150.00) dollars per annum.
That the salary of the City Clerk be and is hereby fixed at the sum of Fifteen Hundred (\$1500.00) dollars per annum.
That the salary of the City Attorney be and is hereby fixed at the sum of Twelve Hundred (\$1200.00) dollars per annum.
That the salary of the City Treasurer be and is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Hundred (\$300.00) dollars per annum.
That the salary of the Foreman of Public Works be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) per annum.
That the salary of the City Marshall be, and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) per annum.
That the salary of each of the police officers (except such policemen as are appointed for special duty and for a limited time less than a year) be and is hereby fixed at the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900.00) per annum.
That the salary of the Superintendent of Water Works, ex-officio Chief Engineer at the Water Works, be and is hereby fixed at the sum of Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1200.00) per annum.
That the salary of the Assistant Engineers at the Water Works be, and it is hereby fixed at the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900.00) per annum, each.
That the salary of the assistant to the City Treasurer be and is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) per annum.
That the salary of the stenographer in the City Clerk's office be and is hereby fixed at the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) per annum.
That the salary of the assistant to the City Clerk be, and is hereby fixed at the sum of Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700.00) for ten months.
That the salary of the Superintendent of Water and Sewer Mains, ex-officio sewer inspector, be and it is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) per annum.
That the salary of the Fire Marshal and Assistant Fire Marshal and firemen be and it is hereby fixed at the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) for the first hour of attendance at each fire, and Fifty Cents (\$.50) per hour of actual service rendered for each hour thereafter.
That the salary of the Assistant night fireman be and is hereby fixed at One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180.00) per annum.
That the salary of the City Fireman in charge of the fire station shall be, and is

Meeting of Board of Trustees

The regular meeting of the village board of trustees was held Monday evening, July 7th. A petition for the opening of Woodward Ave. was received, signed by the property owners along the proposed street, residing in the village. The road and bridge committee recommended that the petition be granted and the report was accepted. A motion was made to increase the salary of the village marshal ten dollars per month. The motion was lost. James Fritch presented a communication asking that the saloons be closed on Sundays. The communication was referred to the license committee and said committee was ordered to investigate the matter with the purpose of finding out if the change was true that the saloons were open on Sunday. An ordinance providing for the appropriation for 1913 was then passed.

Deerfield's win two out of three
