GENERAL NEWS.

PITTSBURGH, PA. — Bulletin No. 1055 from the comptroller of the currency under date of July 7 contains the usual list of "approvals of reserve agents." In the list it appears that on June 7, the First-Second National bank of Pittsburgh, Pa., has been approved as a reserve agent for the First National bank of Houston, Pa. Exactly ten days later, and on the exact date, July 7, the bulletin was dated, the First-Second National bank was closed by authority of the same government department that had certified it as a safe place for the Houston bank to keep its legal reserve.

NEW YORK—Two young women were before Magistrate Reynolds in Brooklyn charged with fighting in Fort Greene park. Grace Maguire was asleep on a bench in the park with her clothes very much disarranged. Matilda Christie was going through the park and saw Grace asleep on the bench. She tapped her on the soles of her shoes with an umbrella and told her to arrange her clothing. Grace jumped up and Matilda alleges, she assaulted her and threw her over a wire fence, and she was not able to get back. In court Grace accused Matilda of stealing her pocketbook, which Matilda denied.

FORT WAYNE, IND. — This city has perhaps a deeper interest in the Perry celebration held at Erie a week ago, owing to the fact that this city boasts of one of the cannon which actually figured in the great battle ship victory on the Great Lakes. The cannon is now being duty at a hitching post in front of the residence of Mrs. Clark Fairbanks on East Perry street, although, owing to the great increase in the number of automobiles, it has been long since the cannon has been used for that purpose. Pictures of the cannon have been taken and were displayed at the celebration at Erie.

TULSA, OKLA.—Chas. Page, said to be worth \$5,000,000, has adopted 300 poor children and hopes to swell the number of 1,000. He has provided that at his death the bulk of his estate will go toward helping poor children and maintaining a home which he has established at San Springs, a suburb of Tulsa. Page has financed a street car line which runs from the village to the home and each day the poor children who do not live at the home are gathered up and taken out there, where they are taught in one of the best schools of the state.

ATLANTA, GA.—Mrs. Mary Crawford formerly Mrs. Mary Bishop of Farmington, Pa., charged with poisoning her aged husband Joshua B. Crawford to secure his estate of \$50,000, was released from jail on \$5,000 bond. Attorneys for Crawford's relatives announced that they have secured an affidavit from Fred Lump of New York, which contains damaging allegations against Mrs. Crawford. In the affidavit Lump states he heard Mrs. Crawford say she would kill her aged husband.


KANSAS CITY, MO. — An association of aero clubs, representing the principal cities of central and western United States, is to be organized at a meeting to be held here in August. George M. Myers, president of the Kansas City Aero club, announced. Mr. Myers, who called the meeting, said Indianapolis, Cincinnati, Akron, St. Louis, Chicago, Dallas, Topeka, Omaha, Denver, Salt Lake City, San Francisco and Springfield, Ill., will send delegates.

WASHINGTON — President Wilson has granted unconditional pardons to William F. Kettenbach and George H. Kester, each sentenced to five years' imprisonment for making false reports to the comptroller of the currency on the condition that Lewiston (Idaho) National bank, of which they were president and cashier respectively. They were convicted April 4, 1911, but have not served any of their sentences.

CHICAGO—Miss Elizabeth Curtiss is the beneficiary of a \$75,000 estate left by her mother, Mrs. Mary F. Curtiss, widow of George H. Curtiss. The will was filed in the probate court. The Grace Episcopal church at Galena, Ill., would have received \$1,000, the Hyde Park Protective association \$500, and the St. Peter Episcopal church at Cheshire, Conn., \$500 if Miss Curtiss had not survived her mother.

LONDON, ENG. — Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst and Miss Annie Kenney who were recently temporarily released from prison because of illness induced by a food and water strike, were arrested. After escaping from the detective who had placed her under arrest Mrs. Pankhurst jumped into a cab. A wild chase ensued before the famous militant leader was rearrested.

MEXICO CITY — Five more arrests were made in the plot to assassinate President Huerta, Minister of War Blanquet and General Felix Diaz, provisional commander-in-chief of the army. Sixteen are now held in a house in Guadalupe, a suburb, which the conspirators used for their headquarters, several hundred rifles and revolvers and 6,000 rounds of ammunition were found.
