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ILLINOIS PARAGRAPHS.

PEORIA—The question of whether or not a woman can be excluded from a saloon, now that she is a voter, was brought to the attention of the trustees of Peoria Heights, when a motion was made to bar minors and women from saloons. A lively discussion followed. Larson was on his feet in a minute to protest against the motion. Now that women have the right of suffrage, he contended, they have the same right to enter a saloon as men. Under old ordinances, women are prohibited from entering wine-rooms, but whether they could be excluded from buying a drink over a bar was more than the trustees were prepared to say.

CHICAGO — An exodus of nearly one-half of the population of Cherry, Ill., that survived the terrible mining disaster of that town three years ago, is chronicled in the report made to the Cherry relief commission at its semi-annual meeting in Chicago. Most of the survivors have emigrated to other mining towns in Illinois where they had relatives. Some of them have gone to the far west. Some of the boys of families, where the father was lost have taken up mining as their life work. A few have abandoned the trade at which their fathers lost their lives.

SPRINGFIELD — The name of Major J. W. McClaughry, for years warden of the federal prison at Leavenworth, has been presented to Governor Dunne for the position of warden of the Pontiac reformatory. Major McClaughry, who is seventy-four years of age, was for four years warden at Pontiac under Governor Altgeld and later served as warden of the state penitentiary at Joliet, under Governor Tanner. It is said his appointment is being urged by a number of Chicagoans who are interested in prison reform work.

CHICAGO — George Thompson, a negro, has been found guilty of violation of the Mann act by a jury in Federal Judge Geiger's court. Thompson was charged with transporting Emma Han on a fifteen-year-old white girl, from Chicago to Hammond, Ind., and from Hammond to Niles, Mich., for improper purposes. They were married in Niles. A motion for a new trial was made and the date for argument on this motion was set for July 2.

QUINCY — Ray Pfanschmidt, slayer of his father, mother and sister and Miss Emma Kaemjen, a young school-teacher friend, was sentenced to be hanged Saturday, Oct. 18. The sentence was pronounced by Judge Guy Williams in the circuit court of Adams county. Before pronouncing sentence Judge Williams asked him if he had anything to say. The simple answer was, "I am innocent of this charge."

CHICAGO — Samuel E. Linton, a traveling salesman of Bloomington, Ill., and Mrs. Pearl Bower Kline, daughter of Mrs. Edward Power of Barry, Ill., were married in the roof garden at the Hotel LaSalle by the Rev. Dr. J. P. Prushinham, pastor of South Park avenue Methodist Episcopal church.

AURORA — Justice Cortez Durkin of this city has adopted an original marriage ceremony which is finding favor with the brides in that vicinity because the word "obey," which since the days of Adam and Eve has been a stumbling block in the matrimonial mart, has been consigned to oblivion.

SPRINGFIELD — A city wide search has been started for Max B. Bischoff, a grocer, who has been missing several days. He left home to open the store. The family was notified a short time later that the establishment was closed and that the proprietor had not made his appearance.

MOLINE — Failure to get what they considered a reasonable offer for bonds the promoters of a new half million dollar hotel which manufacturers propose to erect at Fifth avenue and Fourteenth street have about decided to give up the enterprise for the present.

AURORA — Emancipation of the ordinary everyday police officer was accomplished when the city council voted an appropriation to buy the members of the force Panama hats and "sketch" serge coats in place of the regulation helmets and heavy blue coats.

KANKAKEE — Saying she was compelled to wed C. Rosendahl, a widower of Kankakee county, Miss Anna Beyer of Chicago appealed to State's Attorney W. H. Beyer to protect her and free her from the undesired alliance.

PEORIA — Frederick Steckel, injured in the explosion at the Clarke distillery died at the Proctor hospital. A short time later William Denson, another victim, died. Charles Mooney is not expected to live.

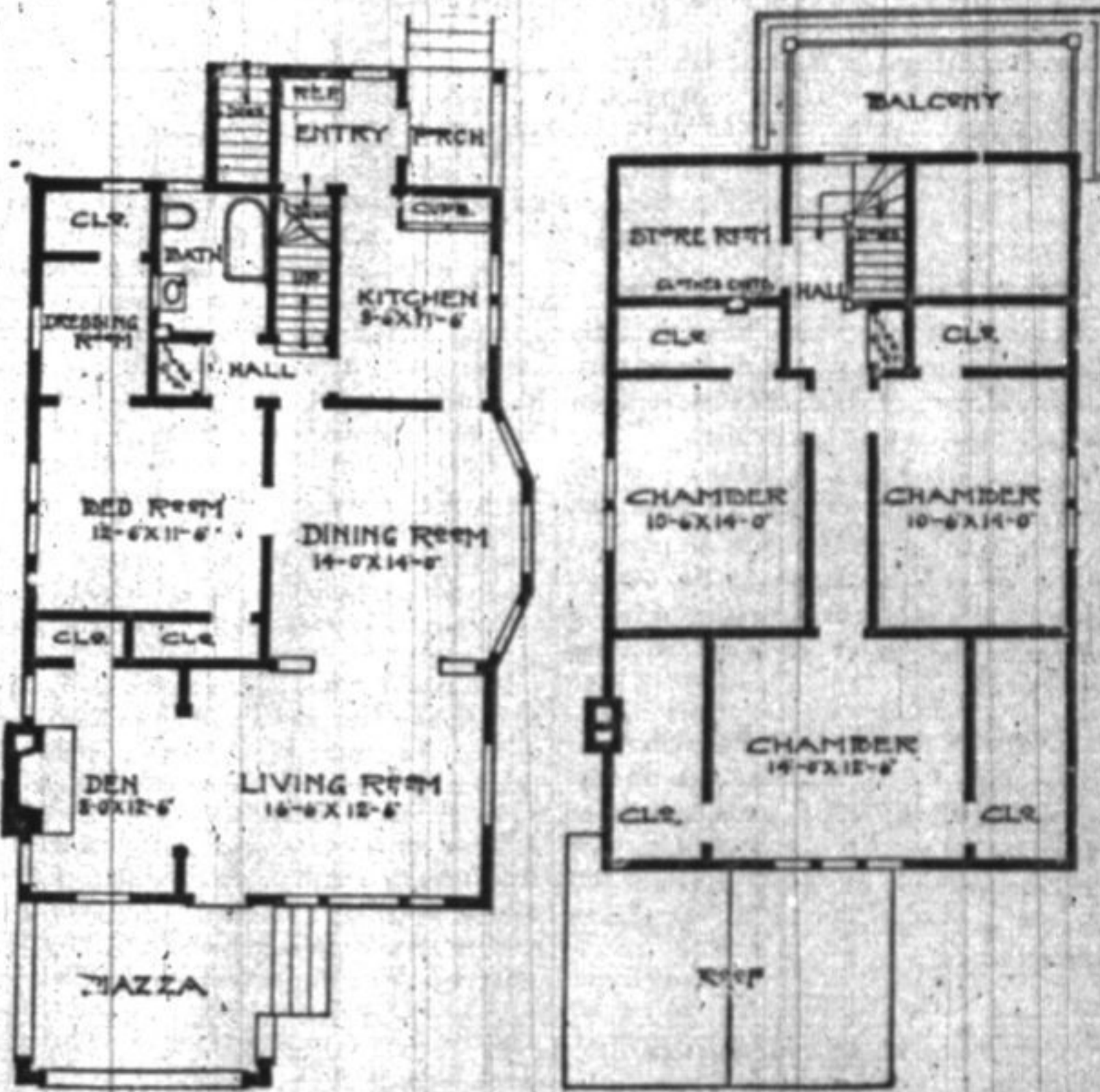

FIRST FLOOR PLAN

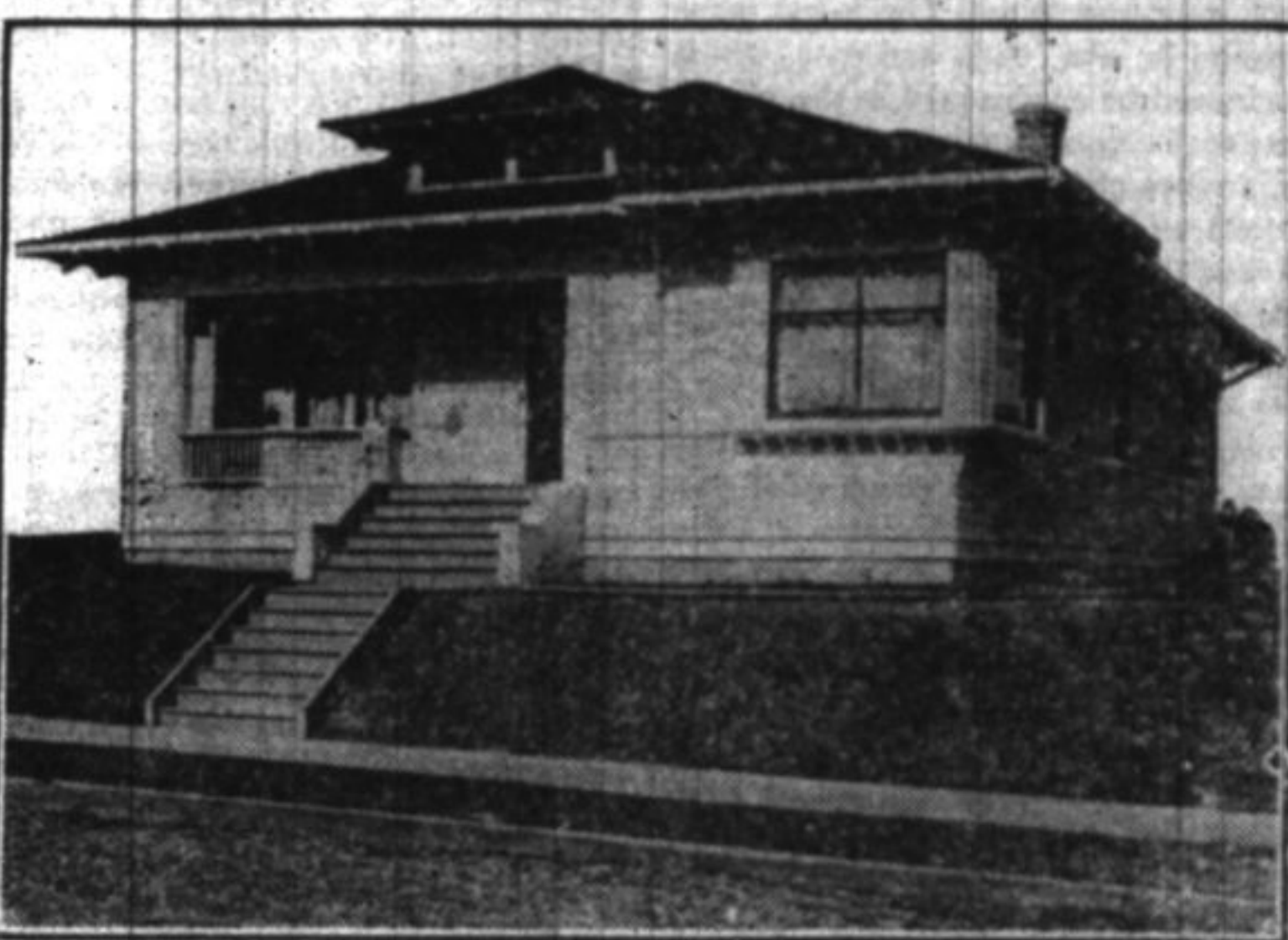
SECOND FLOOR PLAN

This bungalow plan has a den and living room across the front. Could be made into one large living room if desired. There is a bedroom and bath in the first story connected with a dressing room or sewing room. Second story has three chambers. Full basement under entire house. First story, 9 feet; second story, 8 feet. Size, 28 feet wide and 40 feet deep over the main part. Finish in first story red oak or birch, pine to paint in second story. Birch or maple floors. Cost to build, exclusive of heating and plumbing, \$3,500.

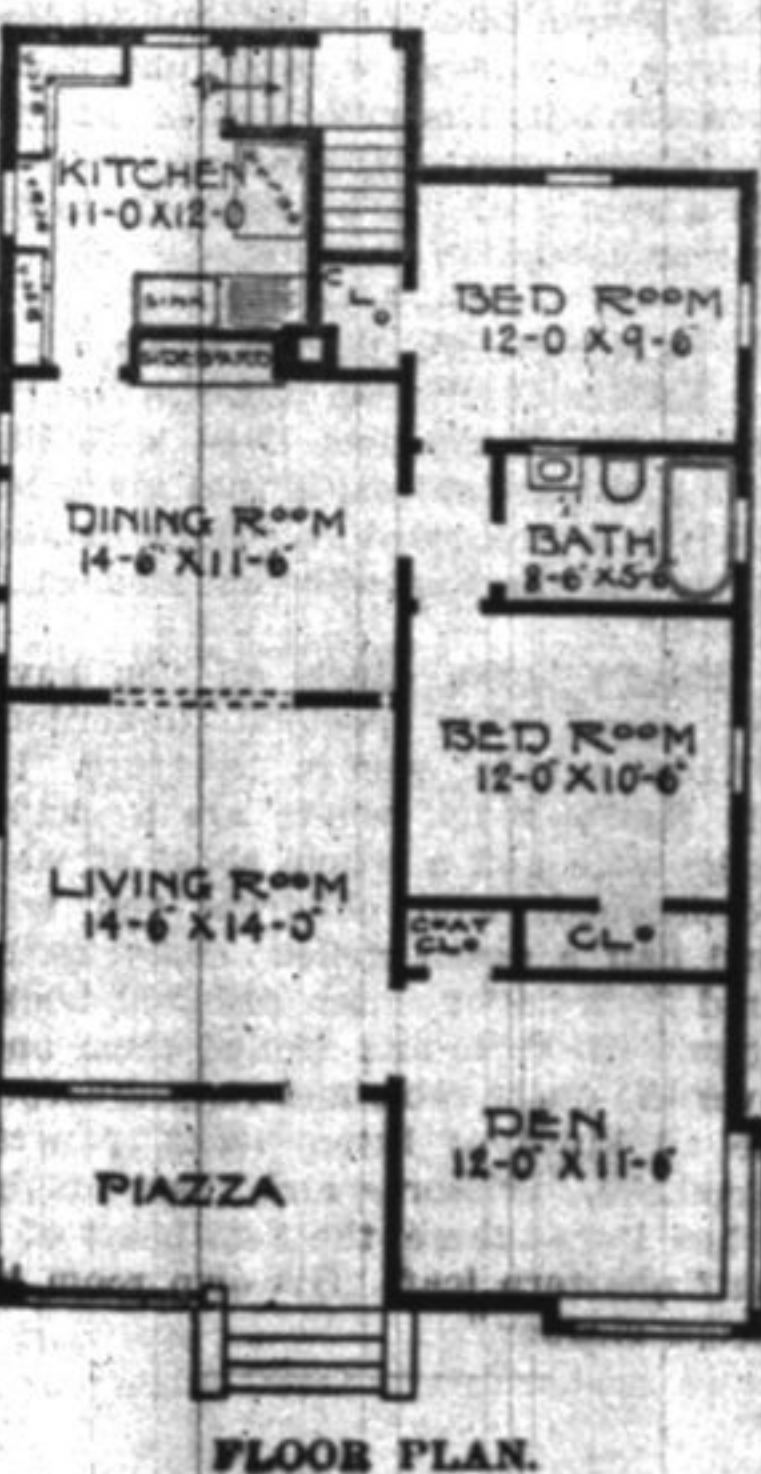

FLOOR PLAN

This little bungalow has a carpet of three chambers. The den in front can be used as a chamber if one desires. It has a good piazza, large living room and a good sized dining room, with built-in sideboard. The kitchen is complete and conveniently arranged for doing the work. There is a full basement under the entire house. First story, 9 feet. Red oak or birch finish in living room and dining room; remainder in birch, with birch or white maple floors throughout. Size, 28 feet wide and 42 feet deep. Cost to build, exclusive of heating and plumbing, \$2,000.
