### GENERAL NEWS.

**CHRISTIANA, NORWAY**—Mysterious stories of an attempt to kill the ten-year-old Crown Prince Olaf have caused a great commotion. An armed man was found hiding a week ago in the gardens where little Olaf plays. The man was arrested, but the fact was hushed up by the police. It is reported that the queen was prostrated and sobbed for hours, repeatedly saying that the royal family must leave the country, and that a bill now before the storting virtually puts a premium on Olaf's head. That bill provides that if the king and the queen die without a male heir, Norway shall become a republic.

**CHICAGO**—Postmaster Campbell said that he expects to receive from Washington early this week definite instructions as to how the new improvements in the parcel post service shall be put into effect. Commenting on the fact that the department had decided on increasing the maximum weight of parcels from eleven pounds to twenty pounds and that there was to be a reduction of

rates and a simplification of service, he said: "The department order doing away with the distinctive stamps and permitting ordinary postage stamps to be used on parcels was an excellent thing."

**LONDON, ENG.**—Anna Held had a narrow escape in an automobile smash while motoring from London to Brighton. The driver of the car was a French count, who, unfamiliar with the English rules of the road, was trying to avoid a collision with another vehicle when he overturned the car. Miss Held and her maid were pinned to the ground. The actress was painfully bruised and complained of shock, but was able to proceed to Brighton in another car.

**NEW YORK**—A man who remarries after the death of his wife ceases to bear any relationship to the dead woman and therefore has no control over her body. This, in effect, was the decision of Justice Philbin in deciding that George B. Stone could not remove the body of his wife from a plot in Woodlawn cemetery to a single grave, so that he might sell the plot. Stone told the court that the plot where his wife was buried cost \$1,700 and he needed the money he could get by selling it. A sister of the dead woman opposed the removal.

**NEW YORK**—While busily engaged in household duties in her home, Mrs. Patrick Vaughn, wife of a chauffeur, was seized with a violent fit of sneezing and coughing. A violent paroxysm brought from his wife's throat the remnants of a bullet which was accidentally shot into her head thirty years ago. In half an hour Mrs. Vaughn was ready to start on a vacation she had planned to begin.

**MEXICO CITY**—Five more arrests were made in the plot to assassinate President Huerta, Minister of War Blanquet and General Felix Diaz, provisional commander-in-chief of the army. Sixteen are now held. In a house in Guadalupe, a suburb, which the conspirators used for their headquarters, several hundred rifles and revolvers and 8,000 rounds of ammunition were found.

**LONDON, ENG.**—The court circular announces the engagement of Prince Arthur of Connaught and the Duchess of Fife. The couple are second cousins. The duchess who was born May 17, 1891, is the daughter of King George's eldest sister, Princess Arthur of Connaught is the son of King George's uncle.

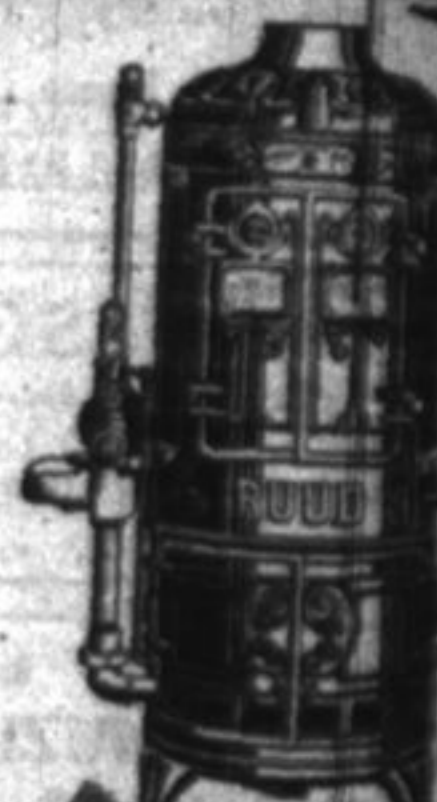
