## EIGHTEEN AUTOISTS PAY TOLL

Number of Speeders Increases. Other Means of stopping them seem Necessary

Eighteen Autoists Pay Toll. During the past two weeks eighteen auto drivers have been arrested here for speeding and other offenses and to date they have paid fines totaling \$105. Some, whose cases were continued have yet to be assessed and their contributions will add to the fund. Most of the offenders have been almost cheerful in the manner in which they have, to use the words of a Chicago prosecutor, "peeled the amount from a roll of bills and gone on their way as easily as though they had lost the amount on a game of poker." This man, City Prosecutor McInerney of Chicago, says he knows of but one way to stop these speeders who make the roads unsafe for both careful drivers and pedestrians and that is to send them to jail when found guilty. "Let it be known," he says, "that they are to be locked up if their cases are aggravated and I warrant there will be a remarkable decrease in the speeding evil."

Among those arrested here last week was a young person who gave the name of Louis F. Swift, Jr. Louis was not arrested for speeding but because he wished to hog the road and refused to get on his own side when another autoist wished to pass him. At that he would have escaped the fine of \$3 and costs. Justice Smith assessed him if he had been a little more careful in the language he used toward Officer Rechtenwald who made the arrest. The offense occurred at Central and St. Johns, a dangerous corner even when the drivers are using all care.

Another man who talked too much was a Mr. Leatherbee of Lake Bluff. This gentleman's offense took place on July 3d at which time Officer Wing states that he drove his motorcycle at 61 miles an hour and then succeeded only in gaining slightly on the offender. Later Mr. Leatherbee boasted to friends, in the hearing of Highland Park men, that he had "pulled the cork" of the local policeman. On this information he was arrested. His case will be tried Saturday.

## Nearby Locals

Fifteen thousand dollars is the amount figured on to erect and complete the new Catholic church at Highland to take the place of the structure destroyed by fire a short time ago.

The proposed extension of the school district along Tenth street east from Tenth to McAllister avenue did not pass the North Chicago council, and according to the prediction of Mayor Christenson, who, all along has held the deciding vote in the controversy, it is a dead issue so far as he can see now.

The Village of Glencoe will test the practicability of the concrete pavement according to action of the village board last week in approving the estimate of this plan of street covering, for Wentworth avenue when no objectors appeared in the meeting. The avenue will be paved from the Chicago and Milwaukee electric railroad east to the lake. The estimated cost is \$10,519.
