### REUNION OF LAKE COUNTY VETERANS

Thirty Fifth Annual Meeting at Waukegan August 20 and 21

Final preparations have been completed for the entertainment of the members of the Lake County Soldiers' and Sailors' Reunion Association, which is to assemble in Waukegan this year on August 20 and 21 for the 35th annual reunion.

The forenoon of Wednesday, Aug. 20, is to be devoted to getting acquainted and general visiting among the guests. At 1 o'clock there will be an automobile parade. At 2 o'clock there will be a baseball game and at 8 that evening the annual campfire will be held. President Jones will call the meeting to order; music will be furnished by the G. A. R. Veterans Pipe and Drum Corps; prayer will be offered by Rev. J. W. Funston; and the North Shore Quartette will sing. Mayor Bidinger will make the address of welcome. The evening will be devoted to reminiscences of camp life.

At 9:30 a. m. on the second day the annual business meeting will be held, and at 10 o'clock another ball game is to be played. At 1 o'clock a band concert will be given, while at 2 o'clock the principal exercises of the session start. Music for this occasion is to be furnished by the G. A. R. band. The address will be made by Judge Chas. S. Cutting. Short impromptu addresses will be given following Judge Cutting's address. ### UNDER WATER 23 MINUTES, REVIVED

Work of Resuscitation took Nearly Twenty-four Hours

There have recently been given two striking and convincing illustrations of the fact that resuscitation of the apparently drowned is a matter of patience and perseverance. The New York life-saving service reports the case of a man who was resuscitated after he had been under water 23 minutes. The work of resuscitation took over a day. A like report comes from Atlantic City of a man who was revived after he had been in the water 10 minutes and had been worked with an hour.

These instances furnish a valuable lesson for this season, when the swimming resorts are thronged and drownings are so common. They teach that no one should be given up as drowned until he has been worked over at least 24 hours.

Unquestionably many men and women, and especially many children have been given up as dead when proper methods, sufficiently protracted, would have saved them—Exchange.

### WEEDS SOURCE OF DANGER

Lake Forester Points to Growth Along Roads as Menace

One of the greatest sources of danger to people driving on country roads, either with team or automobile, is the weeds along the roadway.

On most of the roads the weeds and sweet clover are allowed to grow rank and close to the wheel tracks.

This is especially true where the roads have been piked. A driver in turning out to meet a team or an automobile cannot see whether he is turning onto solid ground or down an embankment, and is likely to slide or tip over into a ditch.

Weeds have been the cause of more automobile accidents on country roads than any other thing. Half the accidents one reads of in the papers, of machines turning turtle, are caused

by the driver not being able to see where he is going on account of the weeds and grass in the road. If the highway commissioners of the various townships would see that the weeds along the roadway are cut, many accidents would be averted and doubtless many lives saved every summer. The commissioners could not make a better use of the people's money than by hiring someone to cut the weeds along the roads.—Lake Forester.
