He allowed five hits and his control was so good that nobody walked. Hubert for the visitors was not hit hard excepting in one fatal inning. The game was replete with spectacular catches and fast double plays. Whiting, Deerfield's center fielder, made two great catches, one after a long run back and the other a one handed stab after a run from center field almost to second base. Oberreuter at second accepted ten chances without an error. For the visitors, Worke at first and Goethe at second, played feature ball. The game suffered a slight delay in the fifth when the "ump" weight 300 lbs. was hit with a thrown ball which keeled him over.
