FT. SHERIDAN WILL NOT BE ABANDONED

IS REPORT OF CONG. T. M. THOMSON

Says War Department has no Plans for Closing Post which may instead be made Brigade Post

With the withdrawal of troops for service on the Mexican border has come a renewal of the rumors that Fort Sheridan is to be abandoned, and they have been given credence by many readers of the papers publishing them. In the belief that the government would not abandon a post which is so splendidly situated and so well equipped, especially in view of the large sums which have been expended in the past few years in enlarging it, both in acres and buildings, the Press has decided that these rumors should not be taken seriously, and so refrained from printing them. Now comes a letter from Congressman Thomson which not only says that the post will not be abandoned, but may be advanced to the position of brigade post. If this should be done Fort Sheridan will become the second post of this kind in the country, the other being located at Chattanooga, Tennessee.

This is what Mr. Thomson says in his letter:
"I have been advised by Mr. Breckinridge, the acting secretary of war, that the department has no plans which contemplate the withdrawal of all troops from Fort Sheridan. I feel quite confident that this fort will not be abandoned, inasmuch as it is so centrally located, I would rather expect that if any change was to be made at Fort Sheridan it would be in the way of securing more grounds for the reservation so as to accommodate an entire brigade."

There was discussion some few years ago concerning making Fort Sheridan a brigade post. Army officials were sent here from Washington, but after an investigation lasting several weeks, it was reported that it would be impossible to enlarge the post because of the high price of land surrounding the reservation. However, it was not long after this that the government purchased considerable land to the west and north of the post.

The rumors as to closing Fort Sheridan originated when Secretary of War Garrison started last month on a trip of inspection to all posts of the country. It was said at Washington that upon his return he would recommend the closing of more than 100 posts throughout the country. The secretary visited Fort Sheridan a week ago Thursday, but upon leaving refused to make any statement as to the future of the post.

Children's Carnival

Thursday was a gala day at Ravinia Park for the children of the north shore and they came in great numbers from all the towns from Chicago to Waukegan. Nearly eight hundred brilliantly attired youngsters formed in parade line at 2 o'clock and marched across the field in front of the stadium in two sections, which were headed by the bands from the Alleandale and Glenwood schools, the actual performance eclipsing the announcements. In point of numbers and variety of costumes the Ravinia delegation was way in the lead, fully one hundred of the marchers, being from the southern end of our city.

No attempt at the formation of figures was made, but after the youngsters had gone once around the field they were led down the center, where each was given a beautiful silk flag by Mrs. McGregor Adams. Then came more marching, almost too much, considering the extreme heat and the youth of the participants, and finally the two sections were brought together and halted while Master Veran Florent played a cornet solo which was received with great applause.

The pictures shown give a good idea of the beauty of the spectacle, although the Press photographer was interested in "snapping" only those children from our own town.

COLORS OF THE SKY.

And Their Connection With Stormy or Sunshiney Weather.

In "Our Own Weather" Edwin C. Martin, after noting the indications of weather shown by barometric readings, the variations of the winds and their meaning, the ever changing forms of the clouds, shows how the colors of the sky act as weather signs. Ordinary observation has gathered a great number of weather signs from simply the ever varying colors of the sky. Among the more familiar and reliable ones are:

A bright blue sky is the sky of fine weather.

A bright yellow sky at sunset promises winds, a pale yellow sky rain and a "sickly greenish" sky both wind and rain. A rosy sky at sunset promises fair weather, but a dark red sky at sunset promises rain. A red sky in the morning promises wind or rain. "A red sun has water in his eye."

"If the sun sets in dark, heavy clouds, expect rain the next day." Even a gray sunset indicates rain. But a gray morning indicates a fine day.

"When the sun draws water rain follows soon."

And, finally, what in this connection it would be perhaps the most reproachful of all possible omissions not to mention:

- Rainbow at night.
- Sailor's delight.
- Rainbow in the morning.
- Sailor's warning.

The Great White Shark.

The man eating fish par excellence is the great white shark. It is otherwise known by the name of man eater. Occasionally specimens are seen on both coasts of the United States, though its more customary habitat is in tropical waters. This frightful creature attains a length of nearly forty feet, and it is able to swallow a man whole. This fact is proved by an experiment which sailors are fond of making when such a shark is captured. The skull being preserved, they amuse themselves by crawling one after another through the distended jaws. It would be unsafe to do this, however, when the head has been freshly cut off, because under such conditions the jaws will snap together secretly for some time afterward if anything is placed between them.
