SPRINGFIELD—The final chapter in the famous Spalding case was written when the state of Illinois gave Charles W. Spalding, former treasurer of the University of Illinois, \$10,000 and decided to him 320 acres of land turned over to the state by Spalding, together with several thousand dollars in stocks and bonds, following his conviction on the charge of embezzlement of \$276,000 of the university funds.

PEORIA—A serious fire broke out in the Clark & Co. distillery, the largest in the world. All the ambulances in the city had been called for ten minutes later. There was much excitement and for a time it was believed that scores had been injured. Later it was learned that only four were hurt.

DECATUR—After an illness lasting nearly four months, veteran Wabash Engineer John W. Bingham, late of the south end local service, died in the Wabash hospital. He ran on the Decatur division since 1900.

ILLINOIS PARAGRAPHS.

SPRINGFIELD—Just barely had Governor Dunning announced that he would allow the bill appropriating \$50,000 to the Illinois and Michigan canal to become a law without his signature when a bill was filed in the Sangamon circuit court, in this city, asking that the state be enjoined from paying out the money. Judge Burke of Chicago filed the papers personally, his name appearing on the bill simply as a "taxpayer." The principal point raised in the bill is that the canal is under control of the federal government, and that under the constitution the state has no right to appropriate any money whatever for the support or maintenance of the canal.

CHICAGO—The woman found with her throat cut in the rear of a theater on West Madison street at night, whose identification puzzled the police for two days, was Mrs. Florence Woodruff. Her husband is Harvey Woodruff. He formerly owned a restaurant. He lives at 2963 Groveland avenue. His wife and a woman companion, Mrs. Mabel Joseph, were on the west side on the night of the murder. In some manner Mrs. Woodruff became separated from her companion. An Italian followed her and the police believe he committed the murder.

DU QUON—Nearly four hundred coal miners were rescued from the Paradise mine near here, which caught fire. Charles Matthis, chief engineer, stood at his post a few feet from the burning chutes and worked the hoist that brought the men up the shaft. In spite of heat that blistered his hands and singed his hair. When the last man was rescued, Matthis fell unconscious. He was taken to his home in a serious condition. Twenty mules were left in the mine.

PEORIA—Dr. William Barnes of Decatur was painfully injured when his car turned turtle, coming down the steep hill south of East Peoria on the Springfield road. The car was being driven by Tom Cannon, his chauffeur, when the wheels got into a rut. In trying to get out again, he lost control. The machine turned over with Dr. Barnes and the chauffeur underneath. Cannon received a broken shoulder.

BLOOMINGTON—A disastrous fire which started in the elevator of A. B. Means at Anchor shortly before midnight destroyed the elevator, B. Hois Central station and W. D. Alexander Lumber company's yard.

CHICAGO—The organization of tens of thousands of Chicago women for the purpose of utilizing the ballot toward the establishment of more liberal liquor laws in Illinois is the result of woman suffrage in this state forecast by the American Brewers' Review, a publication with offices in Chicago and New York, announced as representing "a considerable and influential section of the brewing industry of the United States."
