Special Assessment Notice. Notice is hereby given that the city council of the City of Highwood having ordered that a system of sanitary sewers be constructed in portions of Curtis avenue, Elm avenue and Michigan avenue, all in the City of Highwood, Lake county, Illinois, and the ordinance for the same being on file in the office of the city clerk of said city, and the said city having applied to the County Court of Lake county, State of Illinois, for an assessment of the cost of said improvement according to the benefits and an assessment having been made and returned to said court (docket No. 53) the final hearing thereon will be held on the 15th day of September, A.
