CANNOT TAX OUT OF TOWN VEHICLES

Attorney General says Vehicles may be taxed only in Cities where owned. In an unofficial opinion, expressed in a letter, Attorney General Lucey states that one city cannot demand a wheel tax from a man who pays such a tax in another city. The letter, which follows, was written to Mr. John Wheeler of Geneva, Illinois, in reply to a request for information as to whether the City of Waukegan, where he is at present building a bridge could legally tax his wagons. Springfield, August 20, 1913. Mr. John Wheeler, Waukegan, Ill. Dear Sir: I have your favor of the 15th instant, in which you state that your firm conducts its principal place of business in the City of Geneva, Ill., that you are constructing a concrete bridge at Waukegan, Ill., and have teams and wagons of your own for the purpose of hauling material. You desire to know whether the City of Waukegan may compel you to pay a wheel tax for such wagons. In reply thereto, I will say that at the last session of the general assembly of this state, an act was passed which in part provides: 'That no person shall be required to pay any such vehicle license tax by any municipality in this state, except the municipality in which he resides and no firm or corporation shall be required to pay any such vehicle license tax in any municipality in this state except the one in which said firm or corporation maintains and conducts its principal place of business in this state.' Permit me to add that this is in no sense an official opinion of this department relative to the matter about which you write, but merely an unofficial expression of the statute in regard thereto, given you as a courtesy. FIRE INSPECTORS CALL ON US State 'Clean-up' men say Local Conditions are Excellent. R. B. Conolly and T. J. Walsh, inspectors for the state fire department were in the city Wednesday inspecting buildings, giving the owners pointers on how to prepare against fire and pointing out some of the new laws for fire prevention passed at the last session of the legislature. Among these is the one which requires that all gasoline cans be painted red and in spite of the fact that the law was published in nearly all papers some time ago the inspectors state that merchants in but few towns are obeying it. Other than in this matter the inspectors found local conditions good. Both Mr. Conolly and Mr. Walsh are working on the Highland fire mystery, the burning of Mayor Severson's home, but as yet they have been unable to make a report.

THAW NOT AFRAID Fugitive Declares He Has Braved the Death Chair Twice. SHERBROOKE, QUEBEC—Behind an iron grided window of the Sherbrooke jail, Harry Thaw still fretted and fumed and talked emotionally. He is still confident in himself and exclaimed more than once: 'I am not afraid of Matteawan. I have braved the death chair twice. There is nothing to fear.' Thaw is absolutely certain of his sanity. He remembers the word 'reasonable' and used it a hundred times. It was reasonable, he thought, to map out a colossal campaign of publicity. He spent the day doing so. He was still worried because the note he had sent to the Associated Press, telling it to warn papers throughout the country not to call him a fugitive from justice had been lost in transit.

CANOE UPSETS; THREE DIE Only One of Party Watching Balloon Ascension Escapes Death. BATTLE CREEK, MICH.—Four young persons who had crowded into a small canoe to see a double balloon ascension at Lake Gogneau were thrown into twenty-five feet of water and three of them drowned.
