DAINTY TINY NESTS.

Those of the Humming Bird Are About the Size of a Walnut.
The most exquisite, dainty home built by the bill and feet of birds is that of the ruby throated humming bird. When completed it is scarcely larger than an English walnut and is usually nestled on a small horizontal limb of a tree or shrub frequently many feet from the ground.
This dainty domicile is composed almost entirely of soft plant fibers, fragments of spiders' webs sometimes being used to hold them in shape. The sides are thickly studded with bits of lichen, and practiced indeed is the eye of the man who can distinguish it from a knot on the limb. The eggs are the size of quinine pills.
Although the humming bird's nest is exceedingly frail, there appears to be nothing on record to show that any great numbers of them come to grief during the summer rains. It is, however, not called upon for a long tenure of occupancy. Within three weeks after the two little white eggs are laid the young have departed on their tiny pinions.—Craftsman.

MURPHYSBORO.—Riley Richards, who had shot at his wife three times because she refused to discuss with him on the street the divorce suit she had filed, has been held to the grand jury for assault with intent to murder.

BLOOMINGTON.—Herman Woltzen, of Benson, was killed when an automobile was overturned in a narrow road north of Roanoke. John Jarden, owner of the car, who was driving, escaped with severe injuries.

INDICTMENTS IN HOME CASE

Underground System for Girls' Escapes of Long Existence.
AURORA, ILL.—Six Aurora young men, who were arrested in company with the three young Chicago girls who escaped from the State Home for Girls at Geneva, were indicted by the Kane county grand jury, and warrants for twenty-one more have been issued.
According to Sheriff Brierty of Kane county, an "underground" system which enabled inmates of the home to find freedom outside has been in existence for months without the knowledge of Superintendent Elliott and the executive officers.
