**SYMBOLS IN ARITHMETIC.**  
Origin of the Plus, Minus, Multiplication and Division Signs.  
When you make the sign of + in a problem of addition, perhaps you do not know that you are really using the first letter of the word "plus" in a somewhat altered form. At first the capital letter P was used, but as it was made more and more quickly and carelessly the top part of the letter became merely a horizontal line drawn across the edge of the vertical.  
The sign used in subtraction has even a stranger history. The word minus was first shortened into "mns" with a horizontal line above to indicate the contraction; after awhile only the letter n, with the line above it, was used, and finally the letter was dropped, and now we have only the hastily made horizontal line.  
As multiplication is but a short form of addition, the plus sign was turned sideways into a character resembling the letter X.  
Division was formerly indicated by placing the dividend above a horizontal line and the divisor below. In order to save space in printing the dividend was placed to the left and the divisor to the right, with a simple dot in place of each.—Youth's Companion.

**ORIGIN OF BLACKMAIL**  
The Term Was Born of Outlawry on the Scottish Border.  
The etymology of the expression "blackmail" is historically interesting. It appears to have its origin on the Scottish border and dating from times when frequent political feuds between the two kingdoms of the British Islands partly justified a sort of personal territorial bureaucracy as between borderers of each realm.  
Many of these were outlaws on both sides of the border. Their neighbors, in order to save their cattle from being lifted sometimes compounded for safety by an annual payment as insurance to the bandits. This fee not only gave them immunity, but entailed them to protect them from rival freebooters. It was their "mail," or "protection." The "mail" was so named because it had its armed guard with hooded blunderbuss on the dicker.  
But the mail paid by border farmers was not for guardianship by thieves, and hence was "black" mail, the color of black being typical of what was nefarious, whether in art or in guardianship, while the guardians of this stamp was known as the "black-guard" of the district. The last named latter day term of reproach seems to have obtained its expression originally as here described.—London Field  
**Marry and Part For a Year.**  
Among the many peculiar customs prevalent among the people of Central America is that of parting for one year after the marriage ceremony has been solemnized. This custom has prevailed among the Jarcos from time immemorial. There is no cohabitation allowed to be carried on between the parties prior to the wedding. When a man selects a woman he obtains the consent of the parents on both sides, and if this is given they are at once married. The reason, however, for their not living together as man and wife for one year after marriage is in order to permit of the parties visiting and staying with their respective friends in different parts of the country, which is a customary thing and occupies the time specified. Ninety-nine out of a hundred of these marriages turn out well.
