### SUPERVISORS INSPECT KENOSHA ROADS

Get Information to be Used in Work Soon to be Started

About fifteen members of the board of supervisors spent last Thursday in Kenosha as guests of the Portland Cement Co., the trip being made for the purpose of inspecting concrete roads recently built in Kenosha county. The board recently appropriated \$20,000 to be added to the \$15,505 made available by the Tice law and the whole will be spent on roads to be built under the supervision of the state road commission. The list of roads selected by the board for improvement covers about fifty miles of highway and as the state commission is said to favor concrete which, according to estimates furnished Cook County, costs about \$12,000 per mile it can be seen that many parts of the county are going to be disappointed.

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
