DRAWS PLAN FOR EVANSTON PARK

W. C. Egan gives Officials Benefit of his
 Knowledge and Experience

The park between the track elevations
 on Davis St. is to be greatly improved
 this fall, as the result of the visit paid by
 city officials to the estate of Mr. W. C.
 Egan at Highland Park, under the guid-
 ance of his brother-in-law, Alderman
 Chandler. The Egan place is one of the
 most noted show places in this part of
 the country. Since his retirement from
 business twenty-five years ago Mr. Egan
 has devoted most of his time to landscape
 gardening, with the result that his home
 is unique in its attractiveness.

When Mr. Egan learned what it was
 proposed to do with the park here he
 took so much interest in it that he drew
 a large scale elaborate plan for the ar-
 rangement of the flowers and shrubbery
 that is as complete in detail as any land-
 scape gardener could furnish. In making
 this plan Mr. Egan not only had in mind
 constantly the effect of the massing of
 colors in shrubs and flowers, but also
 that the majority of those who would see
 it would be gazing at it from the trains
 on the track elevations, and looking down
 upon it, which calls for a very different
 treatment from that which meets the
 eye on a level.

This plan calls for no less than eleven
 hundred different plants, shrubs and
 flowers, and they have already been or-
 dered and the shrubs will be put in this
 fall so as to get a good start. The flower
 beds will also be laid out now, and the
 aspect from the Church Street side will
 be entirely changed by the ordering
 away of the express stand to the north
 of the park, alongside of the elevated,
 and the building of a handsome pergola
 which will be put under way at once in
 order that some vines may be planted
 there this fall and cover it entirely next
 summer.—Evanston Index.

 railway to touch it or to build above or
 underneath it."

YOLIVA IS HELD "NOT GUILTY"

Gets Acquittal in Second Trial on Per-
 jury Charge

Wilbur Glenn Yoliva, overseer of Zion
 City, was acquitted of perjury by a jury
 in the circuit court at Rockford, Friday
 evening, Oct. 24th, the verdict being
 reached after six ballots had been taken.
 The perjury indictment was returned in
 Lake County following the investigation
 by a grand jury of alleged fraudulent
 voting in connection with the Zion City
 election of 1910.

The case went to Winnebago County
 on a charge of venue, and when it was
 tried in the April term a disagreement
 resulted, the jury standing 11 to 1 for
 conviction.
