### Elm Place Division

At a meeting last Thursday afternoon at the Elm Place school an interested audience of women listened to an intelligent and scientific talk by Dr. Alice Barbour Brown of Winnetka. She gave a resume of the work of the School Hygiene Congress held in Buffalo this summer. Dr. Brown urged the economic necessity of school inspection and said children inflicted with enlarged tonsils, imperfect sight, defective teeth and especially that most common of the foes of school children, adenoids, will take nine or nine and a half years to complete the work of the eight grades. The average cost to a community of the schooling of one child for one year is twenty-five dollars the extra cost to our city for schooling backward children is what we pay for having no medical inspection in our schools. The next meeting of the Elm Place Division will be held Dec. 11th at three o'clock at which time Mrs. Moses I. Purvin, head of the Civics Committee of the State Federation of Woman's Clubs, will speak. Her subject will be "The School House as a Social Center." This will be a joint meeting with the South Division. The hostesses for the afternoon were: Mrs. Richard F. Peyton, Mrs. James Martin, Mrs. Frank Gardner, and Mrs. Addison Warren.

## NAMING A TOWN.

Concord Was Selected After Fifty Years of Controversy.

The name of Concord, N. H., was given to the town after a controversy which lasted fifty years. In 1725 the land now within its bounds was granted to the colonists under the name of Peacock by the colony of Massachusetts. This claim was disputed by the colony of New Hampshire, which two years later granted this same land to the township of Bow. 1733 Massachusetts incorporated Peacock into a township named Rumford, and for more than forty years a fierce legal controversy was carried on. No agreement could be reached, and the matter was taken to the authorities in England, but even then there was no satisfactory nor permanent settlement. In the face of an erident leaning toward the claims of Bow, both in England and in America, the little band of colonists in Rumford fought valiantly, and in 1765 an act of incorporation was granted to the inhabitants of Rumford. This was still highly unsatisfactory because it only made them a parish in the town of Bow.

The controversy continued until 1774, when it was finally settled and an independent town was formed under the name of Concord. It was due to the devotion of the little band of settlers to their cause and the unity which existed among them that the independent incorporation of the town was finally obtained, and it was emphatically fitting that the concord which existed between them during the struggle of nearly fifty years should be memorialized in their town's name.—Ladies' Home Journal.
