An Ordinance

Authorizing the issue of water certificates of indebtedness to the amount of Fourteen Thousand Dollars, and providing for the payment of the same to be secured by Trust Deed upon the water works plant herein provided for, and providing and regulating the water rates to be charged for water supplies through said water works system.

Be it ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Deerfield, Lake County, Illinois:

Section 1. That for the purpose of construction and furnishing a water works system and appurtenances for the use of the inhabitants of the Village of Deerfield, aforesaid, there are hereby authorized to be issued One Hundred and Forty (140) water works certificates of indebtedness in the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) each dated the First Day of December, A. D. 1913, and bearing interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, payable semi annually: Five (5) of said certificates of indebtedness shall become due on the First Day of December of the year 1915, and ten (10) of said certificates of indebtedness shall become due on the First Day of December in each of the years 1916 to 1927 both inclusive, and fifteen (15) of said certificates of indebtedness shall become due on the First Day of December 1928. Both interest and principal of said water works certificates of indebtedness shall be payable at the office of the Treasurer of the Village of Deerfield, Lake County, Illinois.

Section 2. The water works certificates of indebtedness hereby authorized shall be in substantially the following form: UNITED STATES OF AMERICA STATE OF ILLINOIS VILLAGE OF DEERFIELD WATER WORKS CERTIFICATES

No. \$100.00 Know all men by these presents, that the Village of Deerfield, in the County of Lake, and State of Illinois, acknowledges to owe and for the value received hereby promises to pay to the bearer One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), lawful money, of the United States of America, on the First day of December, A. D. 19... with interest thereon from the date hereof at the rate of six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of June and December in each year on presentation and surrender of the annexed interest coupon, as they severally become due. Both principal and interest of this certificate of indebtedness are hereby made payable at the office of the Treasurer of the Village of Deerfield, Illinois, and are payable out of what is known as the "Water Fund", derived from the proceeds of the water works.

Ordinance No. 2. This Certificate of Indebtedness is one of a series of like tender except maturity issued for the purpose, of providing for the construction and furnishing a water works system in and for the Village of Deerfield, under authority of Chapter 24, of the revised statute of the State of Illinois, and of an ordinance of the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Deerfield, duly passed and published according to the statute in such case made and provided.

And it is hereby certified and recited that all acts, conditions and things required to be done precedent to and in the issuing of this Certificate of Indebtedness, have been done, happened and been performed in regular and due form as required by law.

And it is further certified and recited that this Certificate of Indebtedness issued under and in accordance with the directions of the President and Board of Trustees of the said Village of Deerfield and that said action was had and taken in the manner and form required by law.

This Certificate of Indebtedness is secured by Trust Deed to Cropley G. Phillips of the County of Lake, and State of Illinois, upon the water works system of the Village of Deerfield, Lake County, Illinois.

In Testimony Whereof, the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Deerfield have caused this bond to be sealed with the corporate seal, signed by the President, and attested by the Village Clerk, and have caused the annexed interest coupons to be signed with the fac-simile signature of the President and attested by the Village Clerk this first day of December, A. D. 1913.

(\$), at the office of the Treasurer of the Village of Deerfield, Illinois, for interest due that day on its Water Works Certificates of Indebtedness dated December 1st, A. D. 1913.

Section 3. That the funds obtained by the sale or issue of said Water Works Certificates of Indebtedness, shall be used exclusively for the purpose of construction and furnishing, during the course of construction in and for the Village of Deerfield, Illinois, a water works system, including approximately 10,050 feet of cast iron water main 8" internal diameter, including excavation, laying, caulking, cutting and backfilling; also one meter pit with meters, fish-traps, fixtures, connections, all appliances and appurtenances as shown on the plans

and specifications, and to include legal and all other expenses pertaining to the preparation of ordinance, certificates and construction of said water works. Said water works shall consist of an 8" pipe laid in Deerfield Road, Street or Avenue, from the western limits of the City of Highland Park, where a supply of water can be obtained and running south and westerly along said Deerfield Road, Street or Avenue, to the eastern limits of the Village of Deerfield; said water works system shall have a capacity of not less than 600,000 gallons per day of ten (10) hours, in accordance with the plans and specifications on file in the office of the Village Clerk of the Village of Deerfield, which plans and specifications are incorporated herein, and made a part hereof, by reference thereto as fully and completely as if the same were attached hereto and made a part of this ordinance. The work under these specifications shall conform in detail, and every respect to the printed specifications of the Village of Deerfield on file in the office of the Board of Local Improvements, including all tables and schedules, included therein, and more fully set out.

Section 4. That after the completion of said water-works system, as herein provided, the entire proceeds arising from the operation of the water works shall be placed in the custody of the Treasurer of the Village of Deerfield, and shall be kept separate and apart from any other funds, in a fund to be known as the "Water Fund" and that said funds shall not be used except for the maintenance of said water works, and the payment of the Water Works Certificates, hereby authorized to be issued or the interest thereon, and that no warrant shall be drawn upon the said funds except as herein provided.

Section 5. That in order to secure the payment of said Water Works Certificates of Indebtedness, as herein provided to be issued, the President and the Village Clerk of the Village of Deerfield, be and they are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver to Cropley G. Phillips of Lake County, Illinois, as Trustee, the water works system, thus acquired and all appurtenances thereto belonging.

Section 6. That the water works system after completion and acceptance shall be under the supervision and control of the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Deerfield, or the officers thereof, lawfully appointed by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Deerfield.

Section 7. All water supplied from the water works herein provided for, shall be sold by meters. The charges for water supplied through meters shall be and the same are hereby fixed, in the following scale:

Class A. A minimum charge of Three Dollars (\$3.00) per quarter shall be made, entitling the consumer to use One Thousand (1000) cubic feet or a fraction thereof. A charge of Thirty Cents (\$.30) per One Hundred cubic feet for each additional One Hundred cubic feet payable quarterly.

A discount of five cents (5c) per One Hundred cubic feet shall be allowed on the minimum charge if paid within Ten (10) days after the rendition of the bill, and a discount of five cents (5c) per One Hundred cubic feet on all water consumed over the minimum amount, if paid within ten (10) days after the rendition of the bill.

Whenever any building is now, or may hereafter be erected upon any lot, in the Village of Deerfield, which lot fronts, or is bounded by any street, avenue or public highway in which street, avenue or public highway water supply pipes are laid, there shall be paid to the Village of Deerfield, by the owner of each, building One Dollar and Seventy Five Cents (\$1.75) per quarter for each quarter of the year the water is thus supplied on said street. A rebate of Twenty Five Cents (25c) shall be allowed on same if paid within ten (10) days after the rendition of the bill.

Section 8. The Water Works Certificate of Indebtedness shall not be issued unless this ordinance is published and approved in the manner required by Chapter 24, of the Revised Statute of the State of Illinois.

Section 9. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage. Approved November 10, A. D. 1913.

Adjourned meeting of Trustees

It was moved by Mr. Pettis, seconded by Mr. Kress, that the payment of freight on four cars of tile, C. M. & St. P. Ry., \$139.83, be ratified. Carried. The clerk was instructed to return the freight paid bills to the village treasurer. It was agreed that the village would make no claim for tile taken from the ditch leading from the St. Paul tracks at Deerfield Ave. westward to the slough, in consideration for certain cash contributions and other considerations granted by the property owners who formerly laid the tile. Mr. Reay was instructed to order four six foot scraper blades from the Continental Bridge Co. for use in the construction of two new snow plows.

It was moved by Mr. Pettis, seconded by Mr. Kress, that the matter of clearing the side walks of snow during the coming winter and the work of rigging up two snow plows be referred to the Street and Bridges Committee. Carried.

It was moved by Mr. Kress, seconded by Mr. Wolf, that the clerk be instructed to notify the telephone company to move the village telephone from its present location in the old Knickerbocker house to the boiler room in the new school house as designated by the school board. Carried.

It was moved by Mr. Reay, seconded by Mr. Horenberger, that Mr. Kress be authorized to hire some one to clean out certain ditches in the village at a cost not exceeding \$25.00. Carried.

The clerk was instructed to continue to call the attention of the President to the signing of the water contract at frequent intervals until the contract has been legally completed and also to obtain a blue print of the proposed meter pit at the Highland Park city limits.

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
