Obituary

Colonel Charles McCauley, United States Army, retired, died Saturday, December 20th in his home, 522 Vine Ave., after a short illness. He retired from active service in 1909. His widow was formerly Miss Olive Lay of Chicago. Colonel McCauley was born at Middletown, Pa., in 1847, and educated in the public schools of Reading, Pa. He was appointed to West Point in 1870 and after graduation, was commissioned a second lieutenant in the 2nd Artillery. In 1876 he was transferred to the 3rd Cavalry and promoted to 1st lieutenant. In 1881 he was promoted to captain and assigned to the quartermasters department of the general staff, serving on the general staff until his retirement in 1909. He saw active service against the Indians and was a lieutenant colonel during the war in the Philippines. He improved the army system of signaling with mirrors and wrote several books on scientific subjects.

Besides his widow, three children survive. They are: Miss Katherine Lay McCauley, Ensign Tracy Lay McCauley, and Edwin D. McCauley. The funeral services were held at the residence Monday afternoon. Interment at Reading, Pa.
