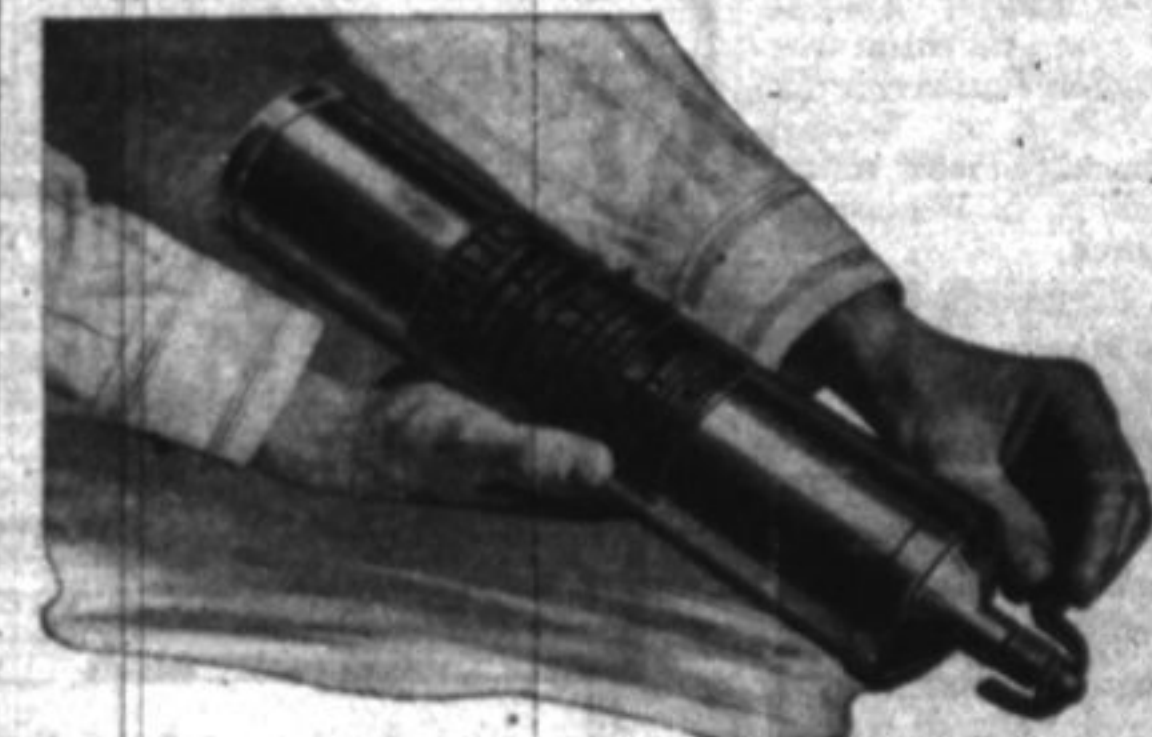

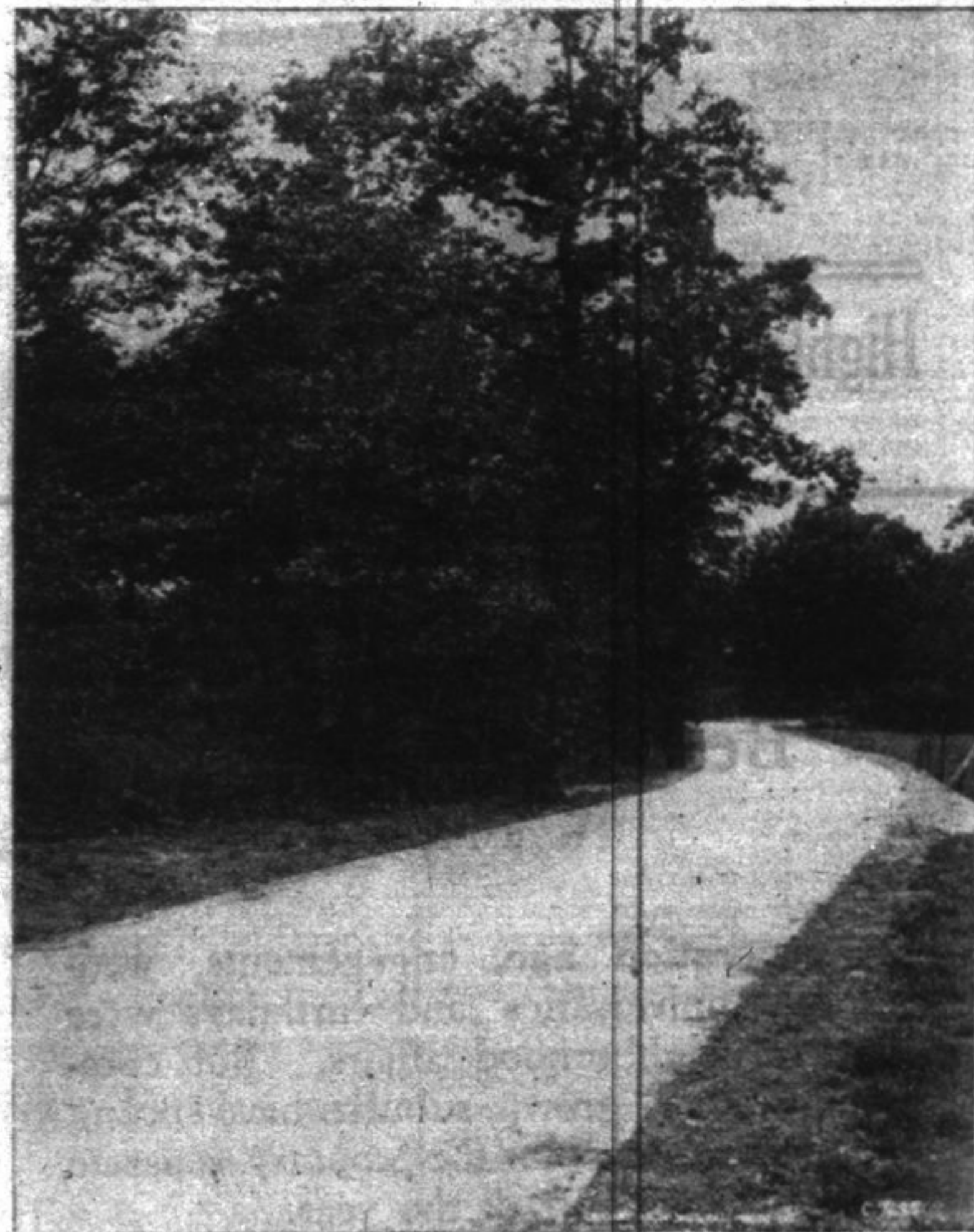

### WAUKEGAN FEARS TYPHOID EPIDEMIC

#### In Spite of Many Precautions Taken by City Disease is Prevalent

Practically free from typhoid fever for nearly two years, Waukegan again appears to be on the verge of a serious typhoid epidemic. If the condition grows much worse it is possible that state experts will be called. The epidemic that exists at the present time has broken out within the last two or three weeks so it would appear that there must be something at fault for so many cases would not come at this particular time when there have been practically none for so long unless the majority of them could be traced to the same cause. There are seven cases at the Jane McAlister hospital at the present time. Some have entered the institution within the last two or three days—some within the last week. All have been taken there inside of two weeks.—Waukegan Sun.

### PREPARE WAY FOR SANITARY DISTRICT

#### Committee Approves Plan for Petition to County Court

At the meeting last week the Executive Committee of the North Shore Sanitary Association approved a form of petition to go before the County Court praying the Judge to define the boundaries of a Sanitary District, which is the first step necessary to get the question of improved sanitation before the people. After the district boundaries have been laid out the question will come before the people in the form of an election for their approval or rejection. Trustees will then be selected and some form of sewage disposal will be decided upon after the engineers have gone over the several plans that have been proposed in the past and that will doubtless come up again.

The present Sanitary Association can take no action beyond starting the machinery moving that will create the sanitary district and name the Trustees who shall carry the matter through to a final betterment of present conditions.
