Notice is hereby given that bids will be received for the construction of a cast iron lateral main water supply pipe four (4) inches internal diameter, to be constructed and laid in, along and under Oak Street from and connecting with the present eight (8) inch water main now laid in Broadway Avenue and from thence southerly fifteen (15) feet east of and parallel with the center line of Oak Street for a distance of three hundred and ninety feet (390), together with shut-off valves, fire hydrants and special castings, all in the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois, as a whole in accordance with the ordinance therefore. The specifications and blank proposals will be furnished at the office of the Board of Local Improvements in the City Hall in said City.

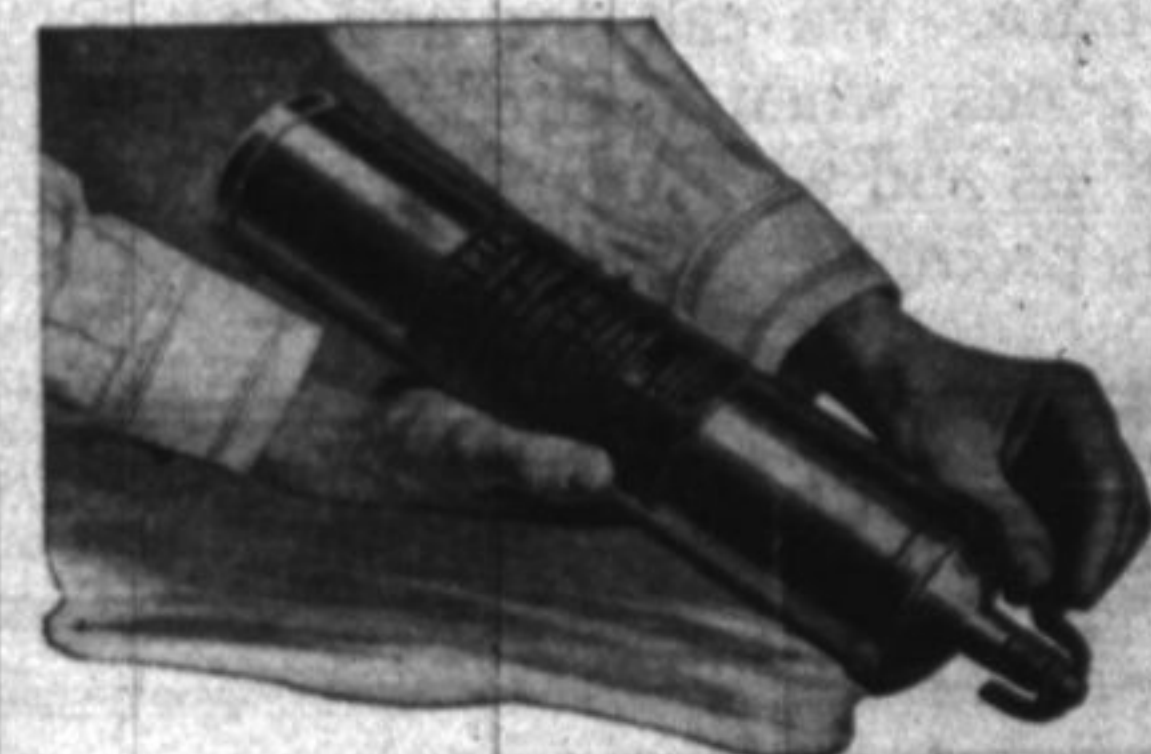
The contractor will be paid in bonds, which bonds will draw interest at the rate of five per cent per annum.
