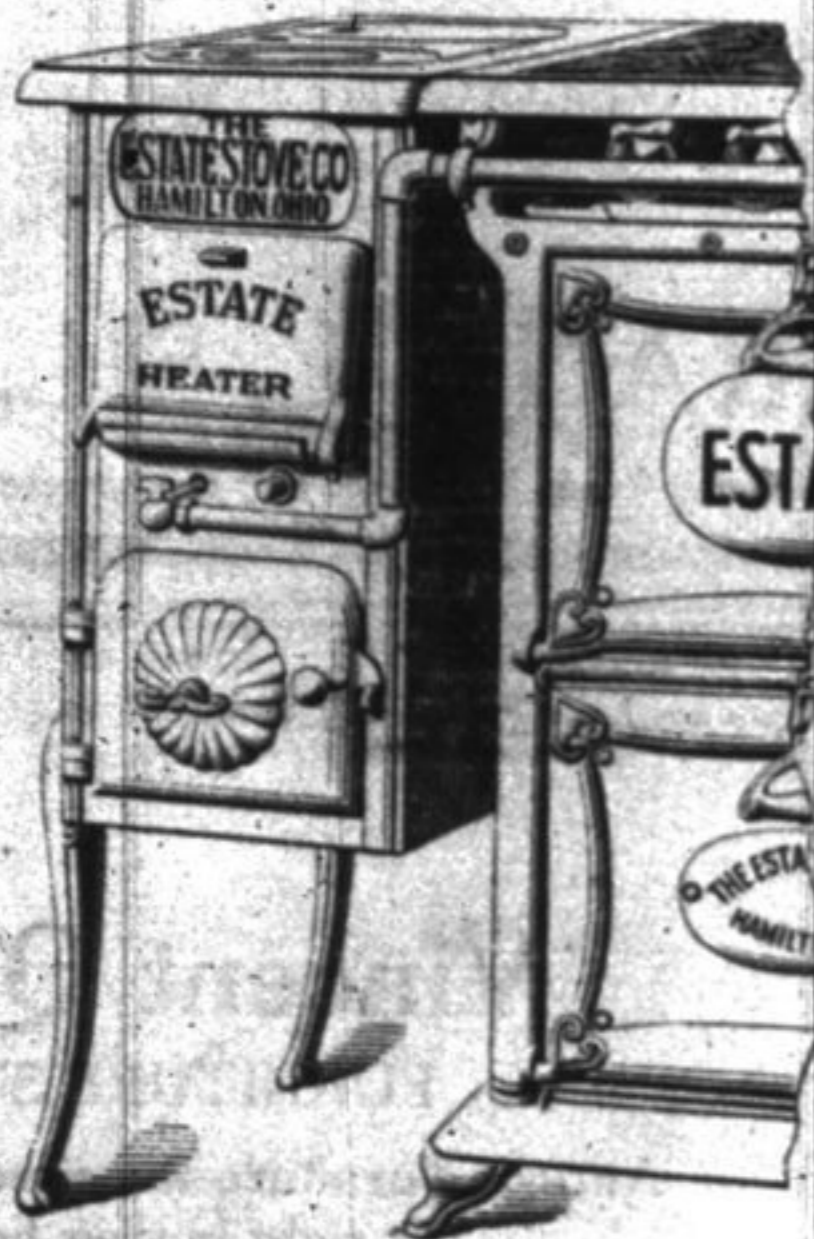

Then on rare occasions his place at the table was vacant.

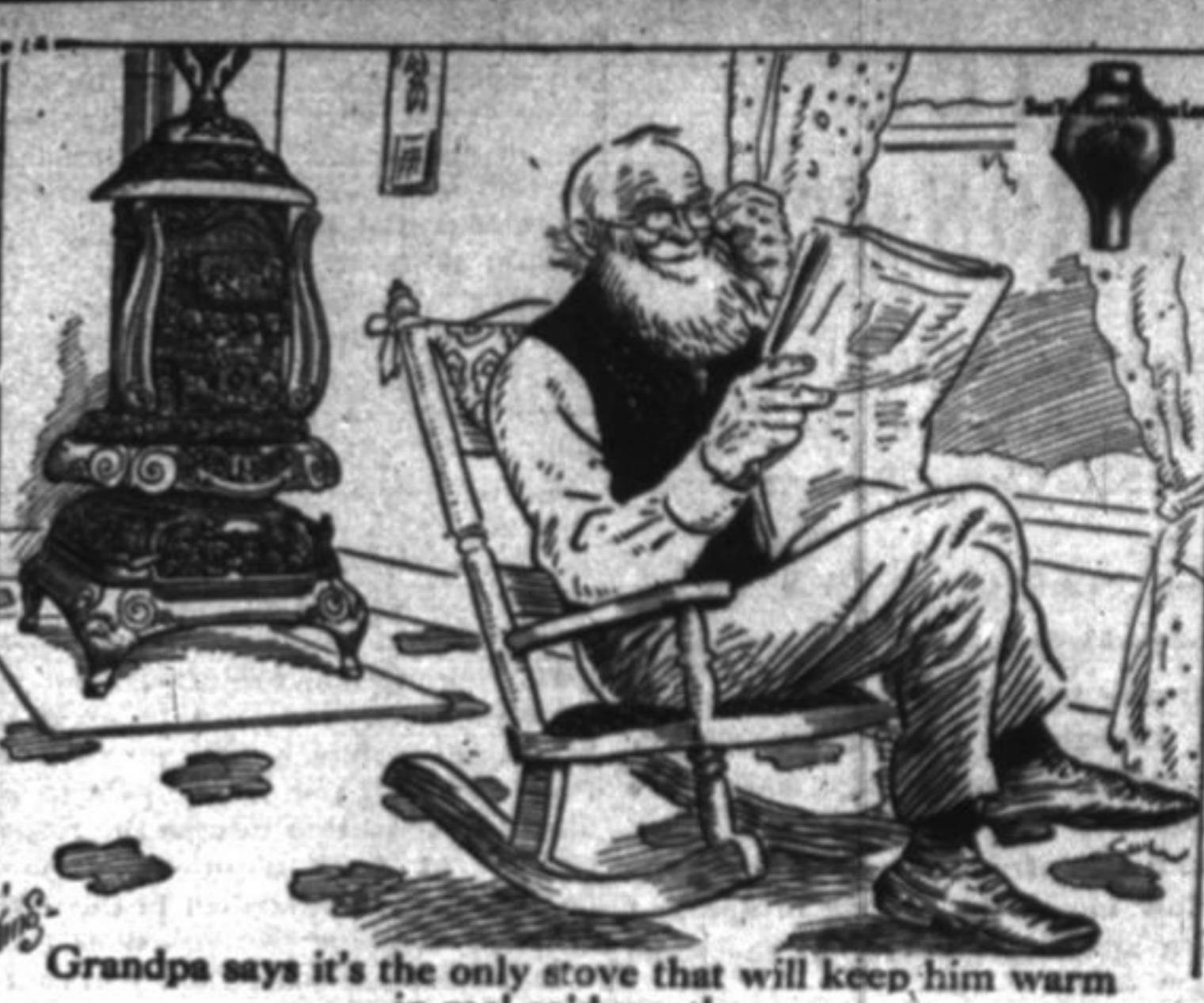
"New friends?" asked the landlady.
