FLINT STONES WERE SCARCE

Our War Office Had to Advise For Them in 1776.

The war office calls upon all persons who know where flint stones can be secured to notify congress.

Was there aught of prophecy in this brief appeal printed four days after the signing of the Declaration of Independence?

A copy of the Pennsylvania Packet contains the advertisement. The newspaper bears date of July 8, 1776, and in the same column explains that the flints are to be used for rifles. And without the old flintlock there would have been no American independence—at least not for many more years after the Boston tea party. If indeed, the colonials unarmed could have mustered up courage to dump the lead lined boxes into the bay.

Further perusal of the old newspaper shows Jamaica rum and sugar were offered for sale by the hoghead; a reward of \$0 was offered for the return of a horse that had strayed away from the range, and a woman who had lost two cows rushed into print with the statement that the individual who would lead the bovines home again would be remunerated to the extent of \$4.

Sheriff's sales occupy a column and a half and the Packet's publisher takes space to announce advertisements are thankfully received, adding that "unless subscribers pay their back dues at 10 cents a copy it will be impossible to continue publication after another month."

EAST INDIAN MAGIC.

The Clever Dry Sand Trick and the Way it is Performed.

A very clever trick often seen in India is the following, which is known as the "dry sand trick."

The fakir brings forward a pail, which he proceeds to fill with water. He then shows some ordinary sand, quite dry. To prove its dryness he takes up a handful and, blowing sharply upon it, scatters it in all directions. He then takes up another handful and drops it into the water. We can all see it lying in the bottom of the pail under the water. Next, showing his hands empty, he places one in the pail and brings out a handful of the sand. Blowing upon it, it still scatters in all directions, showing it to be as dry as ever. This is repeated several times until all the sand is again extracted.

This clever trick is performed in the following manner: Fine, clean sand is selected, washed carefully in hot water several times and dried in the sun. Some of this sand is then placed in a frying pan with a lump of fresh lard and is cooked until all the lard is burned away. The result is that every particle of sand is covered with a thin coating of grease, so that when this sand is dropped into the water it remains dry.—Scientific American.

A Maker of Cripples.

Dr. Charlton Wallace once investigated with great care 4,000 cases of tubercular disease—tuberculosis of the hip. He found that of this number 70 per cent cause of tubercular families or had lived in houses where there had been known cases of active tuberculosis within a year. In both cases the explanation was the same: exposure to infection. When the tubercle germ cannot murder a victim it does its best to cripple him. The only safeguard is to make sure personally that your house does not harbor this greatest of human enemies.—Chicago Journal.

CANING THE CULPRIT.

The Marks it Leaves Look Worse Than the Whaling Feels.

In a London police court recently a teacher in a public school was prosecuted for assaulting a pupil by caning him. The magistrate decided that he had not used undue violence and therefore discharged the master.

In this case the father of the boy who had been caned took him to a physician on the evening of the day of his castigation and this doctor found about fifteen wheals on the lad's back. This was evidence of severe punishment, but the magistrate considered it was not too severe for the offense which had caused it, and said that parents had formed an exaggerated opinion of the amount of force that had been used.

Commenting on this the London Lancet says:

"A blow from a cane causes at the time an appreciable amount of pain (which, by the way, is what it is intended to do, but it leaves behind a mark quite out of proportion to its formidable character to the amount of suffering which it causes after the first sting has been endured. If any one doubts this, having perhaps avoided the opportunity to observe it in the course of an exemplary boyhood, the experiment is easily made. Any small boy will be willing to do his share by sullying upon the seeker after truth a sharp cut or two, the results of which will no doubt be distinctly felt for a time, but only for about an hour, while there will be visible on the well protected and tender skin of the back for some days wheals which would harrow the heart of any mother."

In other words, a boy's back after a caning looks far worse than it feels.

HARDY TUSCAN WOMEN.

One Vigorous Old Dame Who Acted as a Mountain Guide.

Illustrative of the hardiness of women in Tuscany, Sir Francis Vane relates in "Walks and People in Tuscany" the experiences of two Englishmen who were traveling in Italy and who appealed to a village innkeeper for a trustworthy guide to conduct them over the pass between the mountains of Rondinajo and Tre Potenze. To their surprise an old woman appeared and announced that she had come to make arrangements for the journey. They concluded she must be the mother of their guide.

"What was our amazement to learn that this elderly dame was our destined leader, and indeed she was got up for the fray in long boots and short skirts.

"On we tramped, she always ahead, walking with a fine military swing which a lifeguardman might have envied. The path was difficult and could not be used by vehicles. Our guide led us up the steep way which follows a small and rushing stream issuing from out the side of Rondinajo, and up it we ascended for an hour or more until the pass was reached.
"We here had the merciful intention of sending the old woman back, an intention, however, she very strongly opposed. It was only by allowing her to come some few miles farther on that we could induce her to leave us before she had seen us safely to the end of the journey."

A LIGHT IN AN AUTOMOBILE.

Use One of the Spark Plugs When You Have No Matches.

Did you ever while making an automobile tour find yourself on a lonely country road, perhaps miles from the nearest house, and suddenly discover that you had no matches? If you were anxious to light the lamps or eager for a smoke such a discovery would not prove at all conducive to the smoothness of your temper.

There is a simple way in which any one may secure a light without the aid of matches. You may be anxious for a smoke or it may be getting dark and you want to light your lamp, but in any event you can secure the necessary light if you will follow these directions:

Unscrew one of the spark plugs and let it lie on the cylinder head. Wrap a small wisp of waste around the end of any small stick of wood or if there is none handy wrap it around the end of a screwdriver or any other tool. Dip the waste in the gasoline until it is thoroughly soaked. Of course you should have only a very small piece of waste; otherwise the blaze will be too big for you to handle. After dipping this in the gasoline lay it close to the spark plug and turn the engine over until this plug sparks. This will ignite the waste and you will have a little torch sufficient for lighting your lamp. Even if there is a heavy rain or snow, you can secure a light in this manner sufficient for your needs.—Detroit Free Press.

Fear of Old Military Service.

A prisoner's appeal to the court of criminal appeal for a longer sentence, although the first on record before that tribunal, is not altogether unparalleled at the assize, for offenders who have had the advantage of inside knowledge of the working of the prisons acts have been known to ask the judge to give them penal servitude instead of a short period of hard labor. They shrink from the more Spartan diet and severer restrictions that attach to the nominally lighter sentence. A century ago, when capital punishment was inflicted for some trivial crimes, a prisoner was sometimes given a choice—death or service in the army or navy. And the services in those days had such a terror for some criminals that many elected to be hanged instead of serving their country.—London Spectator.

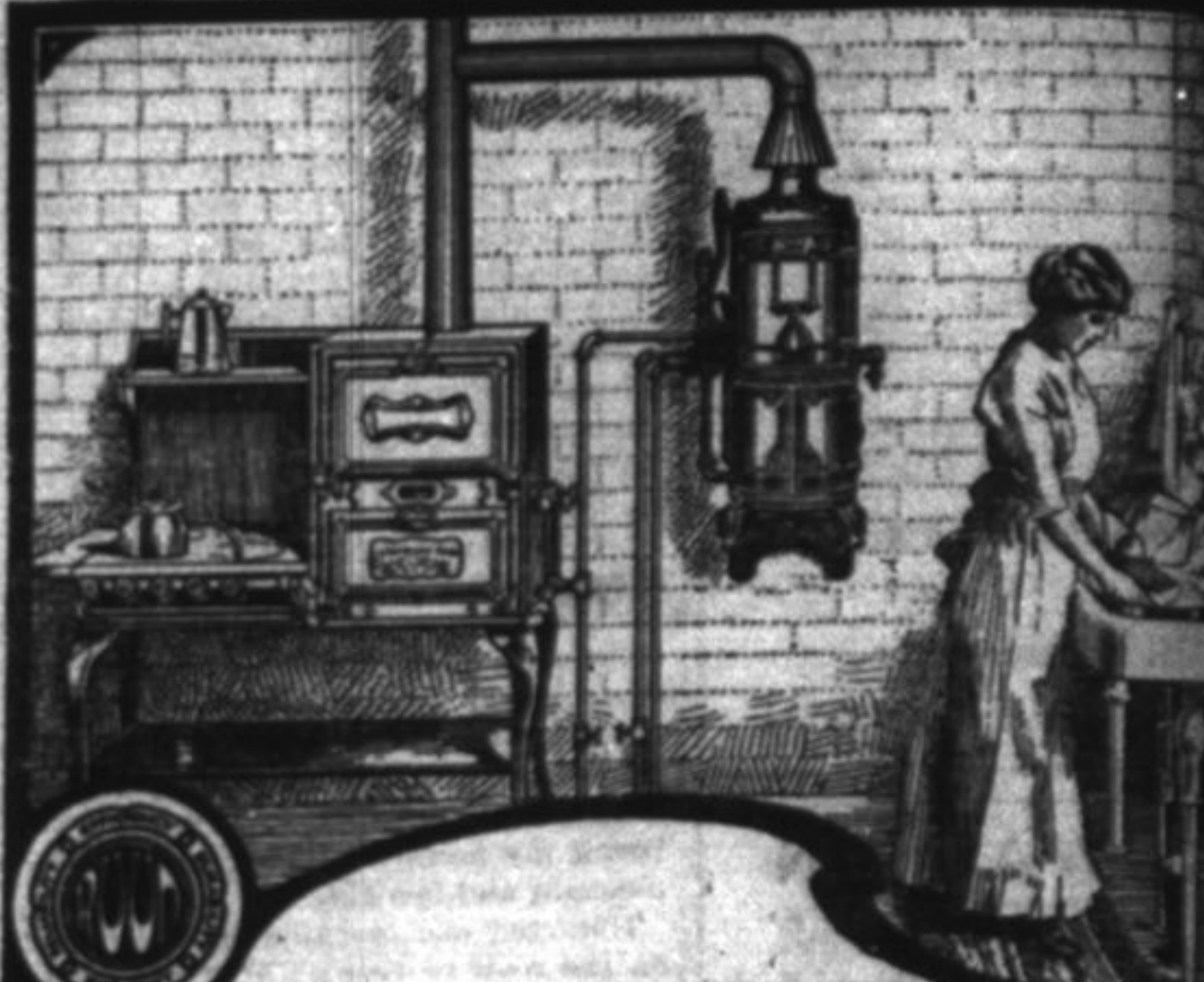
