PUBLIC MEETING AT ELM PLACE

Will Discuss Grammar School Building Questions Monday, March 23

To the Voters and Parents of School District No. 107:

The Board of Education at its meeting held last week received a petition signed by a large number of the voters of the district asking the Board to call an election for the purpose of voting on two propositions, viz:

1st. For or against the proposition to build a school house.

2nd. To locate a site for such school house.

In accordance with the petition the Board has issued a call for a special election to be held on the 28th of March to vote on the proposition so presented and on the future proposition to issue the bonds of the District to the amount of \$250,000, the proceeds thereof to be used for building a school house.

In view of the general interest which the building project has aroused the Board of Education has decided to call a public meeting of the voters and parents of the District for the purpose of there opening to full and free discussion the questions which will be voted upon at the election.

It is hoped that by this means a better understanding may be reached as to the needs of the District for additional school house facilities and also to the location of the proposed building.

The meeting will be held in the auditorium of the Elm Place school on Monday evening, March 23rd at 8 o'clock.

All parents and voters of the District are urged to be present at that meeting.
