### MEET TO MAP OUT ROAD IMPROVEMENTS

### GOVERNOR MAKES APRIL 15 ROAD DAY

State Highway Engineer Addresses County Superintendents and Gives Practical Advice for Starting Improvements

State Highway Engineer A. N. Johnson, has issued a circular letter addressed to the county superintendents of highways, calling attention to the Governor's proclamation setting aside Wednesday, April 15th, to be observed as "Road Day." As the plans are laid this is to be a work day, not a holiday, it being hoped that in every county in the state, the commissioners will meet with all those interested in the "good roads improvement" and make some attempt to outline a plan for inaugurating a general improvement of the roads in their territory.

In his letter the engineer makes many valuable suggestions and these will doubtless be made use of at the meeting as it is only through their use that the work can be made uniform. Among other things he writes: "With the different features of the work before them, the commissioners in each township should outline what is to be done and the County Superintendent should go into each township with the commissioners and arrange in some detail exactly the work to be taken up during the coming season, having in mind accommodation of the greatest number of people, together with the funds available for the work."

You should also interest your commercial associations, having them meet with your commissioners and solicit their cooperation. Many associations will be able to offer cash prizes for the piece of road maintained in the best manner in the locality in which they may be interested.

The work would include grading, cutting down hills and filling low places; grading and widening approaches to bridges, widening and grading approaches at railroad crossings. These should be graded so as to be carried practically level for at least fifty feet on either side of the tracks. If this were done, many of the accidents that now occur at these crossings would be entirely avoided. All earth work should be done as early in the season as possible.

I would suggest that some organized effort be made to have the principal roads in each town first put in condition. These would include naturally all those indicated as State aid roads, and any other

main roads that have not been designated. These roads should be graded somewhat wider than the by-roads and each township should be prepared to spend more time upon the principal roads than on the by-roads. The principal roads should be graded so that the distance between ditches would be about 30 feet. The portion of these roads to be dragged should be 18 or 20 feet. Ditches on by-roads may be as close together as 24 feet, and the dragged portion should be 14 or 16 feet.

On "Road Day" make a beginning. The exact nature of the work will depend on weather conditions and locality. In some instances, it may be possible to start grading crews; others to start dragging crews; others to clean the ditches; and in others to pile the rubbish preparatory to burning. Endeavor to interest as many people as possible in the work, and to have them come out on the road on "Road Day" prepared to do actual work.

### ILLINOIS NEWS NOTES

**Mayor Is Sued for \$100,000.**  
ROCK ISLAND, ILL. — Mayor H. M. Schriver and six members of the police force were made defendants in a suit for \$100,000 damages by John Looney, former publisher of the Weekly News.

Looney alleged he was injured when beaten in the city hall by Schriver two years ago. Looney had attacked the mayor in his paper. There was rioting at the time, which caused the bringing of state troops to Rock Island.

**His Stomach Bullet-Proof.**  
CHAMPAIGN, ILL. — William Boyd has a bullet-proof stomach. He was watching Policeman Thompson battle with two men, who resisted arrest after a brawl, when Thompson fired his revolver at one of his foes. The bullet missed the combatant, but struck Boyd's stomach, going through his clothing and breaking the skin. Boyd picked up the fattened bullet, handed it to the policeman and went on his way to work.

**To Enlarge Starved Rock.**  
OTTAWA, ILL. — About five hundred acres of land, containing the principal canyons of the Illinois River, will be added to the Starved Rock state park.

Governor Dunne has approved several improvements to be made this year, chief of which are a water and fire system, sewers, a public auditorium, garage and a bathing pool. The last three improvements will be made by concessionaries.

**Name New Postmasters.**  
WASHINGTON. — President Wilson has nominated W. V. Lamb for postmaster at Wheaton. Other Illinois postoffice nominations are: Alonzo E. Werts, Abindon; Charles C. Westcott, Chillicothe; Anson I. **Bessie's Failure Furnishes Clue.**  
GENEVA, ILL. — Because Bessie Sullivan was too short and fat to climb into a box car the train pulled away without her, while two of her chums, who ran away with her from the training school in this city, made good their "getaway." The pair were taken from the box car at Fulton and, with Bessie, were sent back to the institution here.

**STERLING, ILL.** — Frank R. ("Doc") Harrington, who had been a mail clerk on the Burlington railway between Sterling and Rock Island for more than forty years, is dead.
