3 KILLED IN WRECK

Train Plunges Through Bridge at Attica, Ind.; Many Hurt.

WABASH EXPRESS WRECKED

Continental Limited Drops to River When Structure Collapses—Steel Cars Avert Horrible Catastrophe—Few of the Injured Are Believed to Be in Serious Condition.

ATTICA, IND. — Three persons were killed, another fatally injured, and fifty others less seriously hurt when the Wabash River bridge collapsed and hurled the Continental Limited train of the Wabash system into the anch and tarry into the river.

Wrecking crews had just cleared away the debris caused by a wreck earlier in the day. Passengers from the former train were transferred to the Continental Limited, and arriving at the bridge, the train started over very slowly.

The engine had nearly cleared the last span, about 150 feet from the extreme end of the bridge, when the crash came. Down went the engine, and down went the bridge clear back to the first pier in the water, and down went the cars on these spans.

The dead are: Tim Hull, engineer, Peru, Ind., married; Jacob Miller, fireman, Peru, Ind., married; J. A. Thomas, Wells-Fargo express messenger, Huntington, Ind.

Engineer Dies in Cab. Tim Hull, the engineer, died at his post, and was probably killed instantly. The engine turned over backwards and Hull was crushed. Fireman Miller was flung out of the engine cab, but caught by falling fragments of the bridge.

Express Messenger Thomas was killed in the combination express, baggage and smoking car by some heavy express packages, or possibly his own safe, falling on him as the car plunged through the opening in the bridge.

Gemmer, Indianapolis, Ind., shoulder broken and badly bruised; Lorenz Gemmer, Indianapolis, Ind., skull fractured, right side of face paralyzed, chin bruised; fourteen-year-old son of Mrs. Gemmer; Miss Marie Kramer, West Lafayette, Ind., right leg sprained and badly bruised; Warren C. Scott, Attica, Ind., right knee wrenched; Rev. A. W. Wood, Lafayette, Ind., superintendent of the Northwest Indiana District Methodist Episcopal church, back wrenched; W. E. Suter, Quincy, Ill., neck strained; Walter Mathes, Williamsport, Ind., back hurt; Mrs. Tom Powell, Williamsport, Ind., back badly hurt; Vans Pollen, Keewanna, Ind., two ribs broken; J. E. Webb, Peru, Ind., negro brakeman, caught between coaches, leg and arm smashed, back wrenched and bruised; J. W. Shaw, Lima, O., back wrenched; C. D. Dummond, Maywood, Ill., chest bruised; Frank Warlin, Detroit, Mich., flagman, hip hurt; Ray Wright, Lafayette, Ind., shoulder and arm hurt, rib cracked; H. O.
