Great credit is due to the choir-mother for the successful management of this affair.

The Turnley choir honor medal for attendance, behavior and attention was awarded on Easter afternoon to Lamar Fearing and prizes were given to Percy Gilbert and William McIlwain, and Fred Lamoreaux received honorable mention.
