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ILLINOIS NEWS NOTES

Dry's Boycott Merchants.
CHICAGO. — Members of the Woman's club of West Chicago went among the merchants shortly before the last election, obtaining their promises to vote for the "drys." Now, it is said, they suspect the merchants voted for the "wets," and have started a boycott.

At a meeting plans were made to collect a sum of money, rent a store, buy provisions, and set up in business some members of the "drys" who shall be chosen by vote, and patronize no one else in the village.

Wage Dispute is Prolonged.
PEORIA, ILL. — The joint committee of the Illinois division of the United Mine Workers and the Illinois coal operators report that little headway has been made toward settling the wage scale dispute.

The miners have submitted a list of 400 demands to the operators and the operators in turn have submitted a list of approximately 350 demands to the miners. Both sides declare that their demands must be met to prevent a strike or a lockout.

Cash Stringency Believed.
SPRINGFIELD, ILL. — The state treasury stringency has been relieved by the arrival of the first 1913 taxes. About \$50,000 came in.

Secretary of State Woods turned over \$402,289 as the quarter's receipts of his office. This is the largest sum the secretary of state ever has turned over for one quarter. Of it \$300,830 is for automobile licenses and goes into the road fund and does not relieve the general revenue situation.

Liquor Men Cry'ng Fraud.
PANA, ILL. — Leading citizens of Pana have been summoned to appear before the grand jury and tell what they know of the holdup of Town Clerk Walter Lester, early Tuesday morning, when the election ballots were alleged to have been stolen. Sensational testimony is expected. State's Attorney Harry Hirschey is conducting the inquiry.

Liquor interests at Pana say they will contest the election.

Rockford "Dry" Citadel.
ROCKFORD, ILL. — Intense interest centered about the fight in Rockford, which was the only large city which was "dry" and which the "wets" sought to regain. Rockford voted "dry" a few years ago, but went wet again, and then was later recaptured by the "drys."

The town went "dry" again by over four thousand majority, despite the fact that the men favored the saloons.

Hobson Bill Hit in Illinois.
WASHINGTON. — Protests against the adoption of the Hobson resolution providing for national prohibition were received by every Illinois congressman. More than 100,000 Illinois voters signed their names to the petition, according to the estimate of members.

The petitions were presented to the house by the several members.

Only 11 Are From Illinois.
SPRINGFIELD, ILL. — The civil service commission announced the result of the recent examination for road engineer. Twenty-seven applicants were successful. Harry E. Bieder of Springfield heading the list with a general average of 88. Of the twenty-seven successful applicants only eleven are from the State of Illinois.

Woman Wins Office Lottery.
WAUKEGAN, ILL. — Mrs. Lohira Rushmore, Republican candidate for town clerk of Grant, won that office when she drew lots at Fox Lake with William Jackson, Democrat.

Each had received 175 votes at the election last Tuesday. She is the first woman to hold a town office in Lake County.

Sheriff Bruner Acquitted.
ROCK ISLAND, ILL. — Sheriff O. L. Bruner was acquitted of a charge of permitting George W. Cain of Rockford to escape jail for \$100.

Four indictments are still pending against Bruner, charging embezzlement, bribery and larceny.

Big Affair of Eagles.
ROCK ISLAND, ILL. — The annual fair given by the Eagles of Rock Island will open next Wednesday with a street parade with 2,000 Eagles in line and will last ten days. The proceeds will be added to the new building fund.

Drought Hits Decatur.
DECATUR, ILL. — Decatur's commissioners will make the city as "dry" as powder. They will prohibit the sale of liquor even for medicinal purposes, close up safe drink parlors and bar shipment of liquor into the city.

Joliet Women Vote "Wet."
JOLIET, ILL. — Complete returns of the election Tuesday, when Joliet was voted "wet," show that sixteen more women voted "wet" than "dry." The women's vote was 4,172 "wet" and 4,152 "dry."

Suicide Over "Dry" Vote.
MATTOON, ILL. — Despondent because Mattoon was placed in the "dry" column in Tuesday's election, "Bill" Murray, a "character" of this city, committed suicide by taking poison.

BRYAN ON TOLLS

Charges Platform Plank Was Put in by Subterfuge.

PARTY NEVER FOR SUBSIDIES

Secretary Sustains President's Position in Issue of Commoner—Says the United States Holds Proud Position Among Nations—Tells About Great Britain.

WASHINGTON. — Secretary Bryan has thrown himself in the canal in his fight and by doing so has raised another issue which will increase the bitterness in the Democratic party.

He charges in effect that the tolls exemption plank in the Baltimore platform was inserted through subterfuge without the convention realizing the full meaning of the declaration.

Occupies Proud Position.
Secretary Bryan, in his statement, also gives for the first time his own appreciation of the standing of this nation under the present administration of the state department in the eyes of the world.

"We occupy today," says he, "a proud position among the nations. We are foremost advocates of peace and arbitration. We are becoming more and more a moral factor throughout the world."

What England Has to Do With It.
"What has Great Britain done to justify the accusation that she is trying to dictate to this country. She has simply called attention to the terms of the treaty and asked for arbitration of the question not construction in case this government differs from the British government in the construction to be placed upon the language."

"In the controversy over the Welland canal Canada withdrew a discrimination which she had made in favor of Canadian ships in order that no cause for friction with the United States authorities in regard to the matter shall exist."

"Why cannot the United States withdraw a discrimination for the same reason? The 'Surrender to England' argument is being used now just as it has been used in the past and for the benefit of the same selfish interests, but now that the people have secured tariff reduction they can no longer be frightened by this subterfuge."

THAW IS VICTOR IN FIGHT FOR LIBERTY

Habeas Corpus Writ Granted by Federal Judge of Concord.

CONCORD, N. H. — Judge Aldrich in the United States district court here early in the day granted the writ of habeas corpus releasing Harry Kendall Thaw, the Matteawan asylum fugitive.

This is the climax of a long fight for the liberty of the millionaire who killed Stanford White.

After the escape of Thaw from the New York state asylum he went to Canada, where he was arrested.

After a long imprisonment there Thaw was deported and was re-arrested in New Hampshire, where he has been fighting for his liberty ever since, opposed by his old time foe, William Travers Jerome.

POLICE GRAFTER IN PRISON

Former St. Paul Chief of Police Sent to Penitentiary.

ST. PAUL, MINN. — Martin Faagan, former chief of the St. Paul police department, and Fred Turner, a former city detective, convicted several weeks ago of participation in the collection of thousands of dollars of blackmail from women of the underworld, were taken to Stillwater, Minn., to begin serving indeterminate sentences of from one to ten years in the state penitentiary.

"DRYS" GAIN IN MINNESOTA

Town Never Without a Saloon Carried by Liquor Foes.

ST. PAUL. — Temperance advocates are elated over their victories in a large majority of Minnesota cities of the fourth class. Madison, Marshall, Luverne and Canby, for scores of years leading saloon towns, and even historic St. Peter, where saloons have operated continuously for more than sixty years, were swept into the "dry" column.
