SHORT CUTS TO THE NEWS

New York bankers charge "political patronage" in the selection of federal reserve centers.
Scarlet fever has broken out at the University of Illinois at Champaign. Four students are stricken.
Three armed men broke into a Ruxbury, Mass., department store, blew up the safe, and escaped with \$20,000.
Toledo, O., now has three-cent car fares, the traction company "giving up the ghost" after a twelve-year fight.
Sale of the Chicago Inter Ocean has been ordered by Federal Judge Carpenter. The paper will be sold to the highest bidder.
Emile Vedrines, brother of Jules Vedrines, and two others lost their lives in a fall while making a flight across the aviation field at Rheims, France.
An unknown assassin, armed with an ax, murdered Mrs. Ethel Francis, of Little Rock, Ark., and three of her children, after setting fire to the woman's home.
Edward Hoffer, chief of Police of Terre Haute, Ind., has been sentenced to jail for contempt of court. His trouble grows out of the election frauds in the Indiana city.
Edward Hines, Chicago lumberman, has won his famous fight with the state of Mississippi involving timber holdings in the southern counties, valued at about \$15,000,000.
Two Chicago girls, Miss Marjorie Chauncey, 17, and Miss Mayme Connors, 22, killed themselves after all-night "joy rides." Miss Chauncey said a man dared her to take mercury tablets.
It is said in Washington that the speech in which Champ Clark criticized the president's canal tolls views, was inspired because the president had not taken Rep. Clark into his confidence on the subject.
Detective W. J. Burns declared upon his arrival in Chicago from Atlanta, Ga., that Leo Frank is innocent of the murder of Mary Phagan and that he will produce the guilty man. A pardon is looked for for Frank.
Harry Payne Whitney, Frank S. Butterworth and Charles W. Semers, investing a huge fortune in downtown Milwaukee building, have promised to build a clubhouse for the Milwaukee Athletic club to cost \$500,000.
New York courts have decided that Miss Florence Louise Brandt, the Iowa school teacher, is not the legally adopted daughter of Wm. Zeigler, the baking powder millionaire. Zeigler left an estate of \$15,000,000. Miss Brandt claimed half.
Indictments for larceny, burglary and receiving stolen property have been returned by the grand jury against officials of the Terre Haute, Ind., traction company. It is charged they rifled the room of a street car men's union organizer.
