DEERFIELD, HIGHWOOD AND HOME ELECTION

STEVENS BEATS STUENKEL IN FOURTH WARD

Moses is Elected in First. Deerfield Votes Out Saloons, the Vote May be Contested. The Results in Highwood

Election proved a tame affair in Highland Park with the exception of the 4th ward. In the 4th ward the vote was split between E. F. Stuenkel, 27 votes. In the first Alfred Moses, defeated Harry Friebele by 53 and in the other two wards there was no opposition. The principal fight in Highwood, at a four cornered, was in the second, where Emma Wagoner, the only woman candidate, made John Peterson's huste to her by 17 votes.

In Deerfield the fight, of-course was the saloon question. As Judge Donn dissolved the injunction the question, legally placed on the ballots and the vote won by 35. The wets may now claim if they believe they have a chance, this election stands it will make practically the entire township dry as the large board controls the sale of liquor a certain distance outside the village of Antioch and Wauconda voted to be wet by majorities of 69 to 36.
