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An Ordinance Fixing the Salaries of Officers and Certain Employees of the City of Highland Park

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Highland Park:

Section 1: That the salaries of the following city officers and employees, fixed at such a sum as is provided for this ordinance for each officer, or employee, for the discharge of the duties such office as required under the laws of the State of Illinois, and the ordinance of the City of Highland Park, during the term of his office or employment commencing the first day of May A. D., 1914, and that such officer or employee shall receive no further compensation from the City of Highland Park, for the duties of such office during the term thereof.

That the salary of the foreman of Public Works be, and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) per annum.

That the salary of the city marshal, and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) per annum.

That the salary of each of the police officers (except such policemen as are pointed for special duty and for a limited time less than a year) be and it is hereby fixed at the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900) per annum each.

That the salary of the Superintendent of Water Works, ex-officio Chief Engineer at the Water Works be and is hereby fixed at the sum of Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1200.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Assistant Engineer at the Water Works be, and is hereby fixed at the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900.00) per annum.

That the salary of the assistant city treasurer be, and is hereby fixed at the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300) per annum.

That the salary of the assistant to City Clerk be, and is hereby fixed at the sum of Eight Hundred and Forty Dollars (\$840.00) per annum.

That the salary of the stenographer of the City Clerk's office be and is hereby fixed at the sum of Six Hundred and Sixty Dollars (\$660.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Superintendent of Water and Sewer Mains, ex-officio sewer inspector, be and it is hereby fixed at the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) per annum.

That the salary of the Fire Marshal and Assistant Fire Marshal and Firemen, be and it is hereby fixed at the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) for the first of attendance at each fire, and fifty (\$0.50) per hour of actual service rendered for each hour thereafter.
