

PERSPECTIVE VIEW—FROM A PHOTOGRAPH


FIRST FLOOR PLAN SECOND FLOOR PLAN



For a suburban, small village or farm home this plan is without equal. There are three reasons why this plan is unusually good for the purposes stated above—first, economy in construction; second, amount of space for the size of the building; third, ample chamber capacity. There is space in the third story for three chambers in case this is built as a farmhouse. There may also be a bath installed in the third story for hired help. The third story so finished will add about \$500 to the cost of the whole. The estimate is given without this third floor finished. The coat closet under the stairs may be eliminated and provide an entrance from the grade door in the rear direct to the third story without even passing through the kitchen. This is a very remarkable and unusual feature for a house designed along these lines. The layout of the first and second floors of the house makes a good comfortable, livable home, with the central staircase, hall, etc. Size, 32 feet wide and 28 feet deep over the main part. Full basement. First story, 9 feet; second story, 8 feet in the clear when finished. Birch or maple floors throughout first and second stories, 1 1/2 inch face. Finish in first story red gum, second story southern cypress, birch or Washington fir. Cost to build, exclusive of heating and plumbing, \$2,950.




PERSPECTIVE VIEW—FROM A PHOTOGRAPH
