

### **NEW SERIES OF STAMPS ISSUED**

Five Denominations Principally for Parcel Post use are sent out Postmaster Grady has been notified by

the postmaster general that the department has issued five new denominations of stamps intended primarily for use on parcels, but valid for postage on all classes of mail. The denominations are seven, nine, twenty and thirty cents. The new stamps are of the same shape and the same size of the series of 1911.
