With all these appropriations it is in 1,220,00 teresting to note that the City Clerk's 821.00 estimate of the amount available for the 1.200.00 Improved Road Fund is \$5,700. Of this, \$1000, a slight increase over last year, is 2,273.00 supposed to be coming from auto fines and \$3500, an increase of \$900, from the vehicle tax. The appropriation for repairing three streets which the council has made reduces the amounts available for all other work and leaves, if the total of \$5700 is realized, only \$919.88 available for oiling. It is interesting to note that The cost of new construction will be the amounts being appropriated so freely approximately 162 cents per cubic foot, have not been secured as yet.
