Presbyterian Church Notes

"The Korean Christian Under Fire" will be the theme of an address to be given at the Highland Park Presbyterian church next Sunday morning at the 10:30 service, by Rev. George McCune, D. D., missionary from Pyeng Yang, Korea. Dr. McCune is in attendance at the General Assembly before which he recently gave an account of the prosecution and trial and imprisonment of the Korean Christians. He himself has been the center of attack which has been made by the Japanese government. It was the boys from his school at Pyeng Yang that were cast into prison and tortured and persecuted that they might be induced to make confession of a plot that did not exist. Dr. McCune tells in a most graphic and impressive way of the heroism and fortitude of these young converts, and explains the significance of the whole government, and what it has meant to the native Christians and church of Korea.

tary of your board a certain sum monthly with which to employ a clerk to do the actual work of keeping and preparing all records for the board and performing all clerical work necessary in special assessment work done or ordered by the board, I beg to say that such an allowance is proper and lawful provided that it is paid from the money received from the various special assessment accounts as the six per cent provided by statute to be applied toward the cost of making and collecting such assessments.

On motion of Ald. Obee, same was referred to the Building and Grounds committee, for report at the next meeting of the city council.

Carried.

Ald. Obee moved, seconded by Ald. Putnam, the adoption of the following resolution:

BE IT RESOLVED that the appointment of Ald. Buckley by the Board of Local Improvements heretofore made on the 11th day of May A. D. 1914, to act as president of said board during the absence of Mayor Hawkins, be and the same is hereby approved, and that all acts heretofore done by him as such acting President of said Board, be and the same is hereby satisfied, confirmed and approved.

Carried.

Ald. Moses presented the following resolution:

RESOLVED, that all plats which have been accepted by the city, be recorded in the city book of plats, and that Mr. Shields be engaged at a sum not to exceed \$8.00 a day and for a period of time not to exceed five days.

Ald. Fearing moved, seconded by Ald. Nichols, that the same be referred to the Finance committee.

Ald. Fearing moved, seconded by Ald. Sheahan, that the city clerk be instructed to notify the owners of lots 77 and 86, South Highland, that an ordinance providing for the construction of a concrete walk has been presented to the city council for adoption and that a public hearing will be held at the city hall on June 2nd, 1914.
