opolized practically all the bruising stick-work. Four times the visitors changed pitchers with the hope of stemming the locals' crushing attack, but of no avail.

Ochsner, the star of Evanston's pitching staff, performed first. He lasted till the third when the fierce carnage compelled him to leave the mound. Hale and Miller then took up the burden for short periods during the third inning batting melee, but they failed utterly in stopping the local batsmen. Before the close of the inning Kilby went to the firing line. His main trouble was wildness, but when he did put one over the plate—zowie! Ochsner went in again in the sixth frame and finished the game.

Sixteen bingles for a total of twenty-six bases were amassed by the Crescents. Crolin, Potter, Richards, Flinn and Heilman were the chief pummeleers, although some of the other players, too, got away with a wicked rap or two.

While the local batters were thus thoroughly enjoying themselves at the expense of the Evanston twirlers, Greenslade held the visiting sluggers almost helpless. He allowed, all told, seven scattered hits, one of them a double. He was aided by some magnificent fielding, however on the part of Cassell. The speedy center fielder pulled off a number of classy stunts in the field, the best being his one-handed stab of an embryo home run from slugger Kilby's bat in the third. Richards also accepted a couple of hard chances at short.

After the hilarious third much of the incentive for their best work was lost to the local boys, and they eased up very noticeably. Schmidt the Crescents regular second sacker was out of the game on account of illness, and Jorgensen, who is a catcher, was pressed into service. For Evanston Kilby on third and left fielder Johnson did the best all around work.

The attendance was not so good as on the two previous Sundays, the threatening weather keeping many away. Only about 300 fans turned out.

Next Saturday, which is Decoration Day, the Crescents journey to Glenview, where they clash with the strong Glenviews. Then on the Sunday following, May 31, Glenview returns the visit and meets Flinn's team on its new Lincoln Ave. grounds. These two meetings are certain to test the mettle of the Crescents and to furnish exciting struggles, as the Glenview bunch is freely admitted to be about the best of the suburban teams.
