

Letter Mailed to Vehicle Owners By Police Committee

May 23, 1914

We wish to call your attention to the Ordinance of the City of Highland Park licensing vehicles. This license fee is due the First day of May but your Committee has thought best to extend the time for enforcing the Penalty until the First day of June. This is done so that no man may say when summoned that he has not had an opportunity to obtain his license.

On an after June First your Committee will issue an order to the Police Department requiring them to summon all persons using vehicles on the streets of Highland Park without a vehicle license. These persons will be subjected to the fine provided under the ordinance.

Your committee has devised five different methods to detect violators of this ordinance as it feels that nothing is more unjust than a partly enforced vehicle ordinance and yet there may be those who may be successful in escaping your committee's vigilance. For this reason any reports of violations, which may be made by you either to the chairman of the Police Committee or to the Chief of Police, will be greatly appreciated and the offender will at once be looked after.

If you have not yet paid your vehicle license fee we trust if you intend to use any vehicles on the streets of Highland Park this summer that you will at once get tags for them. These can be obtained at the City Hall. Should you fail to attend to this any person driving your Vehicle will be subject to summons and prosecution and the police records will show that you have had due notice.
