Adjourned Meeting of the City Council
An adjourned meeting of the Village Board was held on June 4th.

It was moved by Kress and seconded by Horenberger that the plat of dedication of Park Ave., presented by Mrs. Hote be accepted and approved. Carried.

It was moved by Kress and seconded by Horenberger that the engineer, Mr. Rossiter, be instructed to make a dedication plat showing that Hazel Ave., be 66 feet wide from Lincoln Ave. to Journal Place. Carried.

It was moved by Kress and seconded by Horenberger that the clerk write the Public Service Co. that an account of the excessive amount charged for the street lights and also that the present revenue of the village does not enable us to maintain this service and asking them to have an immediate conference with the president of the village. Carried.

It was moved by Fritsch and seconded by Juhrend that no watermain belonging to the village be tapped without first obtaining a permit from the village clerk and that no member of the board has authority to grant such permission. Carried.

It was moved by Reay and seconded by Kress that our water meters at the Highland Park limits be kept shut off and only be opened by a permit issued by the village clerk upon authority of the village board or the president. Carried.

The board then adjourned, subject to the call of the chair.

| Notice is hereby given to all persons interested that the City Council of the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois having ordered that St. Johns Ave. from the southerly line of Laurel Avenue, at the Junction of Laurel Avenue and St. Johns Avenue, southerly to the north end of the new Tarvia and Macadam pavement in St. Johns Avenue, near the southerly line of Sheridan Road at its Junction with St. Johns Avenue, be graded, drained, paved with reinforced concrete pavement having a curbed edge and otherwise improved, all in the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois.
