that although these 26 men in the lower house and the two Progressive senators in the upper house held the balance of power, not once did they use it for their political advancements.

We therefore recommend to the Progressives of Lake, Boone and McHenry Counties that they renominate Fayette S. Munro, basing their judgement on his record as a stalwart champion of righteousness in political affairs. We particularly call to the attention of the voters his stand on the important issues presented at Springfield, his ability as a legislator and his unquestioned integrity and ask them regardless of party to reelect him as a representative.

While Progressives generally believe that the party label will not make a candidate an efficient official and that for county offices the integrity of the man is the primary requisite, we are concerned that the Progressive party shall put forth to the voters for their consideration the best candidates obtainable having in mind the large responsibilities of the various offices and their importance to the welfare of the citizens of the county.

That the political offices in Lake County have for years been controlled by a political ring, no man can doubt, that this ring has studiously conspired to prevent the people from knowing anything about county affairs. In the endeavor brought forward by honest supervisors from the various parts of Lake County to secure an audit of the county funds, a few years ago, there stood forth among the number a supervisor of exceptional ability and integrity. T. M. Clarke of Deerfield township made a fight to secure an audit of the county treasurers books. The ring opposed him, but he turned to the county, through the audit \$40,000.00 odd thousand dollars of funds and secured the indictment of a defaulting county treasurer.

As supervisor T. M. Clarke has demanded that the county treasurer turn over to the county \$7,300 as interest accrued from county funds. We maintain, regardless of law, that the interest on county funds belongs to the tax payers and not to the county treasurer, and we pledge ourselves that if the voters elect T. M. Clarke as county treasurer, the interest on county funds will belong to and become a part of the county moneys as they should be.

We recognize that the offices of sheriff and county clerk for the last 20 years have been in the hands of a few men. When one goes out, the other goes in. That these political offices so important to the average voter should be handled by men of character and courage and not by political wheel-horses who have earned by long years of service in political ranks their right to a public office.

We take pleasure in recommending to the voters of the Progressive party for the nomination of Sheriff C. B. Dicks, for County Clerk, Robert C. Kent.

We also recommend for County Superintendent, John H. Harnley, Principal of the Gurnee school; for County Judge, V. V. Barnes.
