According to reports from the city hall, that portion of Deerfield township which was named Ravinia by Mr. B. F. Jacobs and annexed to Highland Park in 1899 is still a part of Highland Park and the aldermen who represent it, J. L. Fearing and W. D. Putnam, also represent the owners of the property at the corner of St. Johns and Central Avenues.
