Notice is hereby given to all persons interested that the city council of the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois, have ordered that a cast iron lateral main water supply pipe, four (4) inches internal diameter be constructed and laid in, under and along portions of Central Avenue from and connecting with the present water main now laid in Highland Avenue and from thence southerly on the westerly side of Central Avenue for a total distance of three hundred and twenty-five (325) feet together with one fire hydrant, all in the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois.

The ordinance for the same being on file in the office of the city clerk of said city and having applied to the county court of Lake County for an assessment for the cost of said improvement according to benefits and an assessment roll having been made and returned to said court, the final hearing thereon will be on the 20th day of July, A. Exmoor Club

On last Saturday, July 4th, the Exmoor Club held what is known to the members as a big celebration, or Independence Day without fireworks. The leading golfing events of the day were the contests for the President's cup, presented by Charles W. Fullerton, in 1899, the 36-hole medal play handicap, for which 16 players qualified and played for the Perpetual cup. The play off for this cup will be on the afternoons of the following Saturdays at 18-hole match play, with the exception of the finals, which will be a 36-hole match play, two thirds of the handicap difference counting. The winner will receive a gold medal and the runnerup a silver medal. The annual "Never Before" trophy, presented by Francis S. Peabody for both winner and runnerup was qualified for in a 36-hole medal play handicap, last Saturday morning. Mr. E. H. Shortwell was the winner and the runnerup A. L. Moore. The four ball contest, in which members and guests participated was an 18-hole medal play handicap. Special trophies were awarded to the winning team. The total of the four net scores was considered. Winners were H. R. Loudon, W. G. Smith, R. C. Viles and L. Maxwell. In the afternoon there was the flag tournament for members; each player at the first tee was given a flag, under which floated a streamer with the players name and his allowance of strokes, par plus his handicap, printed upon it. The flag he carried with him until his allotted strokes were used and where the ball lay on his last stroke he planted his flag. The player covering the greatest distance with his allotted strokes was the winner. The first flag was won by Geo. L. Schumann and John H. Harmon won the fifth flag. Saturday morning, July 11th, there will be a mixed foursome at nine o'clock. This is to be in charge of Mrs. James W. Prindiville and Mrs. Gerard Peck. In the afternoon will occur the 18-hole medal play handicap with a special trophy for the winner. The woman's home tournament began Tuesday of this week and continued through Friday, July 10th. Thursday, July 16th to 18th has been termed as the "Invitation Tournament," at which time each member is privileged to invite two guests. Exmoor trophies will be awarded the winner and runnerup of "A" flights and winners of "B" flights.

FIBRE IN COCCON FOURTH MILE LONG

Progress of Silk Worms in School Exhibit Proves Interesting

The exhibit of silk worms in the windows of the display room of the North Shore Gas Company, one door west of the postoffice, has attracted a great deal of attention this week. The caterpillars reached their full development last Saturday and since then most of them have spun themselves inside of their cocoons. Each caterpillar was about three inches long before it began to spin and in the process of "paying out" its silken fibre with which it securely envelopes itself it shrank to an inch and a quarter. The fibre in one cocoon is about a quarter of a mile long. It takes the caterpillar about three days to complete the cocoon, although the caterpillar itself is hidden from view after about twelve hours of work. The two "spinnerets" of the caterpillar are under its mouth and as the secretion is forced out in fluid form the two streams harden and twist together, forming one continuous strand. The caterpillar, swinging its head back and forth, lays the fibre in figure eight fashion. When the cocoon is unreeling for manufacturing purposes the strand of fibre comes out in an unbroken length of about a quarter of a mile. It requires the entire fibre of about 3,000 such cocoons as those now being formed at the Gas Company's rooms to make one pound of raw silk. That means about 750 miles of fibre.

What happens to the caterpillar inside the cocoon will be a story for a later issue of the Press. Anyone who is interested, however, can find out for himself by watching the window exhibit.

LET CONTRACT FOR NEW ROAD

First Lake County State Aid Highway to be Built at Once

Operating under the firm name of H. G. Goelitz and Company, Goelitz and Johnson, the concern which is building the new south Sheridan Road, has been awarded the contract for the first state aid road to be built in Lake County. The new road extends east from Lake Villa about two miles and will have a concrete center from eight to ten feet wide with a shoulder of macadam on each side from five to six feet in width. The company's bid was \$19,000, which amount the state and county will pay in equal parts. Nine contracts were let by the state commission and only one was higher than that of Lake county.
