Ehibit Proves Interesting

The caterpillars reached their full deelopment last Saturday and since then most of them have spun themselves inside of their cocoons. Each caterpillar was about three inches long before it began to spin and in the process of "paying out" its silken fibre with which it securely envelopes itself it shrunk to an inch and a quarter.
