The report of the police committee, signed by Aldermen Fearing and Nichols, on the Ravinia police question recommended that \$25 per month be paid a special officer who would be required to give the city 14 hours of his time each week. It did not say how the hours were to be divided. Upon motion of Ald. Obee the rules were suspended and a motion to appropriate \$75 for the purpose of hiring a special policeman for Ravinia was adopted unanimously and the Mayor instructed to appoint such officer. The report does not say how long the officer will be on duty nor for how long a period the \$75 will pay his salary.

**The Man Across the Street**

You may have noticed that a contract for repairing the paving on Roger Williams Ave. is to be let and you may remember that this pavement is made of concrete and was laid only two years ago. The excuse for its going to pieces so soon is that it was poorly laid. But is this really a good excuse? The pavement on St. Johns Ave., between Central and Laurel was laid about fifteen years ago. It is made of brick and, according to present standards, was poorly laid but, though it has many depressions where the poor foundation has given way, it is still intact and we have yet to learn of a contract to repair it being let.

The word "without" will occur in this article three, and perhaps more times and very importantly for we know that we are going to say that: Without disparaging the East Park Commission in any manner whatever it can be noted here that, without placing the lake front park under its control and consequently without stirring up further sectional differences—which would surely have been done had the park been turned over to the commissioners—the city has cleaned the park, is keeping it clean and is policing it. All these things Mayor Hawkins said the city could do when he objected to the city giving up its title to the property. But the city has gone even farther for the council has discovered \$300 and appropriated it for the purpose of building suitable service houses.

This brings us to the proposition for turning Sheridan Rd. over to the Lincoln Park Commissioners which is again being agitated. Citizens should remember that when they turn the road over to the commission they lose all control of it but retain the pleasure of paying for its maintenance. The city has always been "hard-put" to find money to pay for properly policing the town but if the Lincoln Park Commissioners, in control of Sheridan Rd., desired to put a policeman every half mile along the road here in order to safeguard traffic they could do so and the city would have to pay for it.

**Obituary**

The funeral services over the remains of the late William E. Berach, who met death by drowning in the Chicago Drainage Canal on Wednesday, July 15th, were held from the Hoppe Undertaking Rooms 4905 Lincoln Avenue, Chicago, Saturday, interment being in Rosehill, and was largely attended by members of the Business Mens' Association and many friends of the deceased had made since coming to this city. He had been a resident of Highland Park for the past three years.

The deceased was born on a farm near Rising Sun, March 7, 1879, coming to Chicago in 1892. In 1904 he was married to Miss Winifred Leal and at that time was employed by the Peoples' Gas Light and Coke Co., Chicago, remaining with them for twelve years. In 1910 he came to Waukegan and was solicitor for the North Shore Gas Co. One year later he was transferred to Highland Park as district manager and retained that position until two weeks ago when he was promoted to publicity manager.

He is survived by a wife and five children, two pairs of twins, Constance and Bertha, age nine; Dorothy and George, age two years; and Ernest, age eight years.

He started to work in the factory of the Price Baking powder company when 13 years old. Another of the pallbearers, Chas. Williams worked under the employ of Dr. Price for over 30 years. The service of the other employees ranged from 15 to 20 years. The pallbearers were named by Dr. Price who selected them, before his death.—Waukegan Sun.

**FUNERAL OF JUDGE WHITNEY**

Many Attend Services for Jurist who Dropped Dead Saturday

**Judge Whitney**

Representatives from all parts of Lake county, members of the judiciary and prominent lawyers representing the entire state were present at the funeral of the late Judge Charles Whitney which was held in Waukegan Monday, interment being in the Oakwoods cemetery of that city. Judge Whitney dropped dead in his chair in the court house in his chambers, at 1.30 o'clock Saturday afternoon while consulting with a client who had called on him just a few minutes previously.

His death was due to heart failure, with which he had been failing for the last 18 months or two years.

Considered as one of the leading men of his county he was also counted among its wealthiest, having much property in and about Waukegan. A brief sketch of his life shows that he had held the following public positions:  
State's attorney of Lake county, 1876-1887—11 years. Alderman of Third Ward, Waukegan, 1882-1884. Mayor of Waukegan, 1885. Master in chancery, Lake county, 1886-1903. Circuit court judge, 1911—to date. Appellate court judge, Seventeenth district, two years. President of Security Savings bank, Waukegan, from organization until a few years ago.

**TAR WAGON BURNS IN STREET**
