Dear Sir:—  
I am in receipt of your favor of the 2d inst. in which you inquire about the commission form of government. Colorado Springs has had the commission form of government since July, 1906, and this form of government has proven successful and satisfactory to our citizens for the following, among other reasons:

1. It has eliminated partisan politics.
  2. It has fixed responsibility definitely on the heads of the respective departments.
  3. It has made a small legislative body and thereby lessened the opportunity of the respective members to avoid having their acts scrutinized by the voters.
  4. It has lessened taxation for administrative purposes.
  5. It has increased efficiency in every department of the city.
  6. It has put the business of the city on a business and not a political basis.
  7. It has largely increased public interest in municipal affairs.
  8. It has lessened the number of elective offices and thereby given the people a better opportunity to scrutinize the character of those who are candidates for office.
  9. It gives all the people a feeling that the existing government is theirs and not one to be supported by a single political organization, and therefore brings to the support of the administration the entire electorate.
  10. It has increased the power of the people by placing in their hands the initiative, referendum and recall.
- I shall be pleased to give you further information I can.

### CONGRESSMAN THOMSON FAVORS POSTPONEMENT

The House suggested, it ought to be insured against fire.

This may seem like an extreme illustration, but it is not. The pending bill is full of such useless appropriations.

Such vicious projects should never receive favorable consideration, and at a time like the present when economy is so greatly needed, I believe that even legitimate and proper projects should not be appropriated for unless a postponement of their consideration will result in loss.

In spite of the legitimate items of the bill, I have opposed and shall continue to oppose the entire bill because it is full of "pork" of the worse kind.

The House is about to consider a War Tax Bill. I presume present conditions warrant that step. But there are two ways of accomplishing the same object. One is by levying more taxes. The other is by cutting off needless expenditures. If a war tax is necessary, why not begin by taxing "pork" and other extravagances? In other words, if the Treasury needs \$100,000,000, let us accomplish that end by killing the Rivers and Harbors Bill, thus stopping appropriations aggregating \$53,000,000 and direct that the money in the Treasury now available for River and Harbor projects amounting to \$52,000,000 be retained in the Treasury and the completion of the legitimate projects involved, be postponed, until they can be better afforded.

If the advocates of the pending River and Harbor Bill persist in putting it through in anything like its present form, and succeed in doing so, I shall vote against any bill calling for an additional tax in the shape of a War Tax, no matter what its terms are.

### Height of Waves.

Among the most trustworthy scientific measurements of ocean waves are those of Lieutenant Paris of the French navy. The highest waves measured by him were in the Indian ocean between the Cape of Good Hope and the Island of St. Paul. Thirty waves measured during a northwest gale there averaged twenty-nine and one-half feet in height, and six of them, following one another with beautiful regularity, were thirty-seven and one-half feet in height. Some still higher waves were seen, but not measured. In a moderate breeze the length of a wave was found to be about twenty-five times its height, but in a gale only eighteen times. — London Globe.
