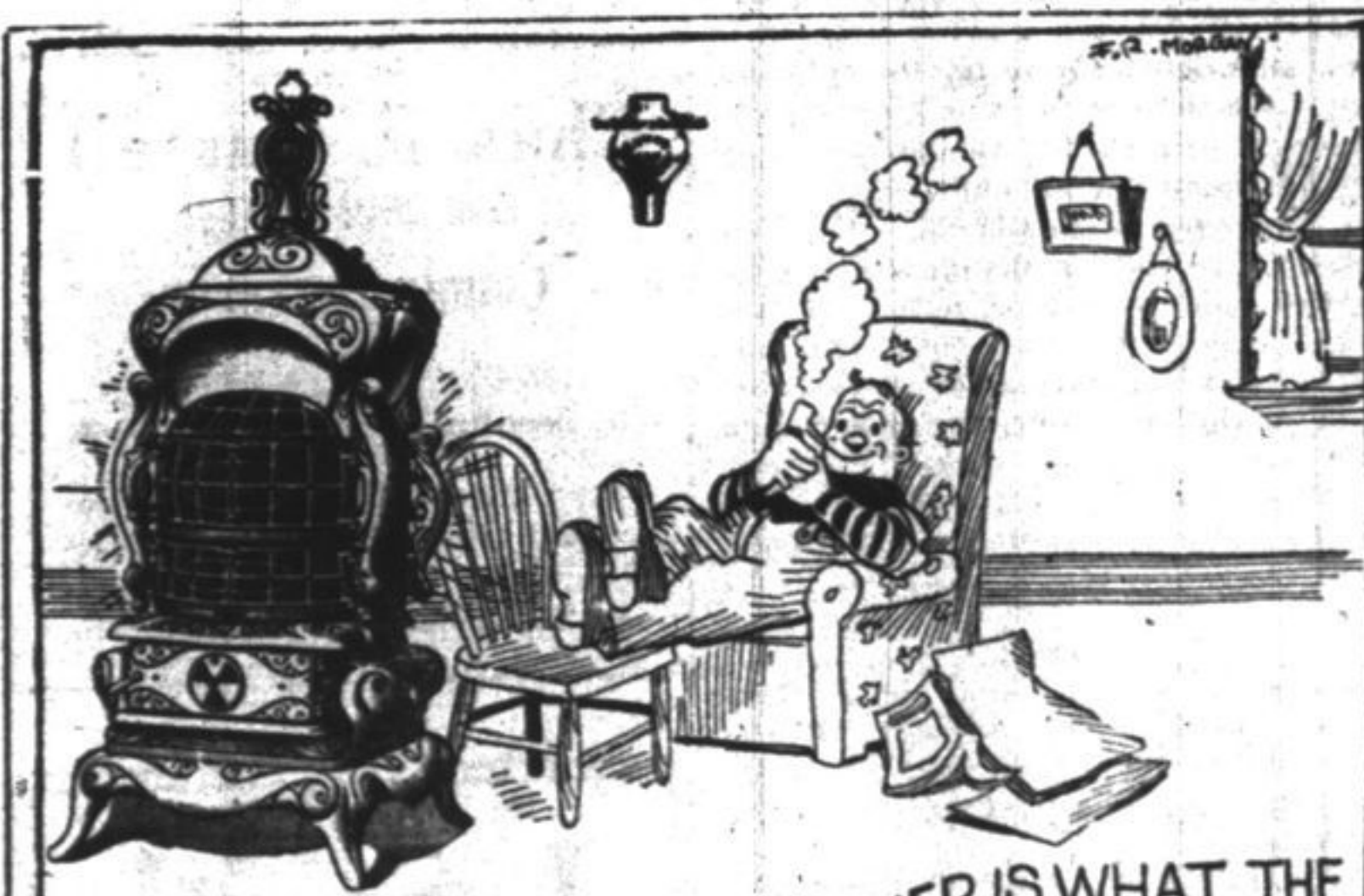

MAYOR OF BIRD LAND.

How the Beautiful Lizard Canary Got Its Unique Name.

The lizard canary is one of the most unique varieties in the cage bird world. Its beautiful ground color, so nicely ticked, and pretty little "cap" make it a thing of beauty and a joy forever. It is, however, the only variety that moults out its plumage at the end of the first season. By this it is meant that, although the bird possesses so beautiful a coat for the first year, the plumage disappears altogether at the second moult.

Thus it is a show bird for only one season, the first—season, and this is considered a drawback to its popularity. On account of its wearing such gay apparel for one year and then putting it aside the lizard has been aptly termed "mayor of Birdie Land."

The little story connected with the lizard and a mayor is well worth repeating. It was at a well known cage bird show being opened by Sir William Treloar, then lord mayor of London, that this celebrity in a few well chosen words likened himself unto the lizard canary, many grand specimens of which were on view at the show. The stately robes he then wore were only for a season. Such is the case with the lizard.—Boston Herald.

Mendelssohn Surprised Them.

The church of St. John's, Waterloo road, has an interesting association with Mendelssohn. The late R. J. Horsley, M. A., tells in his reminiscences how the great musician, while staying with a friend on Denmark hill—in the house where he wrote the "Spring Song"—was induced to go to St. John's one Sunday morning and give a recital on the organ. On reaching the organ loft Mendelssohn was annoyed to find himself exposed to the full view of the congregation and vented his displeasure in a thunderous improvisation which greatly startled the worshippers, used as they were to the "subdued" music then in vogue. Not being in the secret, they were still further surprised when the music ceased and the eccentric performer sprang up, clapped on his hat and abruptly left the building.—Westminster Gazette.

Wild Potatoes.

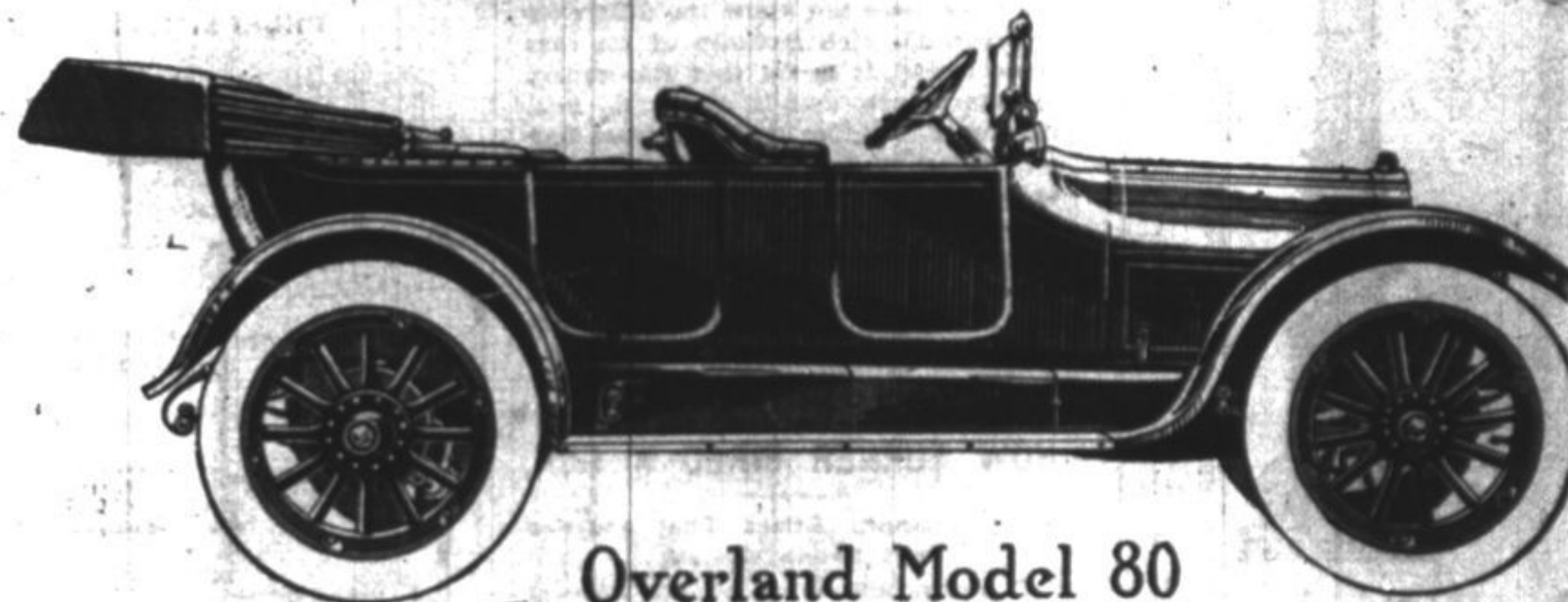
Botanists are unable to discover from what plant the aborigines of America developed the potato, for it is not found growing wild anywhere in the world.
