Highland Park Woman's Club

The Woman's club of Highland Park entertained on Tuesday, Oct. 15th, at the Presbyterian church, the Federation of Clubs of Illinois at their annual meeting. The morning was given to electing new officers, Mrs. W. J. Pyffe being elected president to fill the vacancy of the retiring officer, Mrs. John Harper Long. Four other elections were made. Mrs. A. E. Walker, chairman of the Legislative department I. F. W. C., speaking of the different bills that are being presented before the house—one on injunction and abatement of child labor, a retired bill for teachers, removing political influence in the public schools, permanent custodial care for weak minded women. New York alone has 30,000 with only 5000 cared for. Helping deficient children in the schools—at least 3 of the deficiencies have feeble minded parents. Also have other bills to present for more serious problems. Miss Elsa Worthheim, executive secretary of the Consumers League of Illinois, gave an excellent outline of the good things being accomplished by the league, stating that Illinois ranks as the third industrial state and they want a ten hour law enforced. California and four other states have an eight hour law in shops and factories. The talk was given mostly to the girl behind the counter, to put ourselves in her place for a continual reception. The league is going to ask for a seat for every woman whether employed in factory or shop. Mrs. Fred L. Hatch sent a substitute from the educational department of the I. F. W. C., a demonstrator in the art of canning vegetables and fruit scientifically as it has been introduced into some districts, with a good profit to the child with a small amount of ground; \$136.00 having been realized from 1/2 of an acre. A dainty luncheon was served at 12:30 to two hundred and fifty women. The afternoons program was an address by Mr. Henry Blackman Sells on "The Why of the new theatre movement," looking more to art than the commercial side. President James H. James, Northwestern University, chairman of the State Park Commission, gave a history of Starved Rock and its first discovery by the French in 1682, what difficulties had been encountered in trying to get money enough from the legislature for the purchase, asking for one hundred and fifty thousand dollars and receiving just one half. The park has 800 acres and nineteen canyons; the canyons have all been renamed after Indian tribes. The park scenery is considered as beautiful as Colorado, and the four miles of river equal to the Hudson.
