Notice is hereby given to all persons interested that the City Council of the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois, having ordered that a supplemental special assessment be levied to pay the deficiency of the cost of the work and interest for the construction of a connected system of sewers, in the City of Highland Park, County of Lake, and State of Illinois, with manholes, flush tanks, and house connection plants as follows: Commencing in the bottom of the ravine which runs through blocks 45, 46 and 47, and between block 48 on the north and blocks 31 and 33 on the south, and commencing and connecting with the manhole now located in the public sewer in the bottom of said ravine at a point where said blocks 31, 33 and 48 join or touch each other, thence westerly through said ravine to St. Johns Avenue, thence southerly along St. Johns Avenue to High Street, now known as Moraine Road, thence westerly on said High Street to a point 25 feet easterly from the easterly line of Waukegan Avenue.
